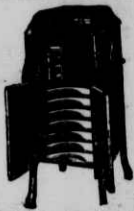

100,000 LIKE HIM COULD LICK WORLD

What Paul S. Noble Says of Film Star, Douglas Fairbanks.

There were 100,000 men in the United States like Douglas Fairbanks, the film star, the government would use an army to lick any nation in the world," according to Paul S. Noble, manager of the American theater, who is a personal friend of Mr. Fairbanks. He spent two or three weeks with Mr. Fairbanks last summer at Long Beach. Mr. Noble says that for a small man Fairbanks is a whirlwind in a fight, and he is looked to appear in a picture in which he fights with determination and reality.

Mr. Noble said when he was making the comedy picture "The Mystery of the Leap" at Long Beach last summer. Fairbanks started for San Diego to work on "The Americano" on the same day on which I started for Butte. I received a cordial invitation to go with him to San Diego, but my business compelled my early return to Butte. Fairbanks made "The Americano" at San Diego and "The Juana, Mexico." After he finished "The Americano," Mr. Noble continued, "Mr. Fairbanks went to New York pending the settlement of a split-up between his director and the Triangle people. Fairbanks is now in the east at the present time on the \$100,000 star. In fact, I am sure that his appearance in Butte at the American theater in "The Americano" Wednesday, Thursday and Friday next week will be the last time he will be seen in pictures at popular prices. I understand that there is a split-up at the present time whereby Fairbanks is to have his own company and be in a position to command the amount of \$750,000 a year. This has not been completed, however, at the present time."

proposing to prosecute all involved in any attempt that might be made on a charge of jailbreaking, which is a felony. Despite vigilance of the guards, however, O'Neill made his escape.

Evaded Guards.

He cut through the thin partition of the room and plaster which encloses the room where the prisoners are kept in the new jail, early Wednesday morning, crawled through the hole into the adjoining room and then burrowed his way through the plaster and lath into the attic, from where he slipped through a window to the sidewalk on West Quartz street by means of a rope made by tying blankets together.

O'Neill's escape was discovered as he was making his way down Alaska street and a shot from a deputy's revolver failed to stop him. He was last seen running east on Granite street.

Box Car Burglar.

O'Neill was held for action by the grand jury on a charge of burglarizing a box car in the local yards and stealing goods in interstate transit.

Three Similar Breaks.

Three previous breaks have been made from the new jail building because of the fact that it has never been equipped with steel cages, although O'Neill's escape is the first one since the O'Rourke administration. It has been made in the same manner by digging through the thin false masonry put into the building so that it might be used until funds were available for equipment of the building with steel cages. So thin are these partitions which stand between some of the 40 men confined in the building that a hole can be dug in with the heel of a heavy shoe.

Redoubt Vigilance.

Every precaution is taken to avert such extra guards are on duty all hours with this in view. This morning the semi-weekly search of the big rooms used as a jail was unavailing. Everything in the jail, including all of the prisoners' personal effects, was examined, and a similarly thorough search was made in the old jail building under direction of Under Sheriff O'Neill.

The commissioners are negotiating the purchase of steel cages from a jail equipment concern and these, it is estimated, will cost about \$18,000. It is proposed to pay \$10,000 cash for the equipment and secure credit for the balance. Two bond issues proposed in a view of equipping the jail have failed at special elections.

With the expense of extra guards have cost the county a sum of \$100,000, sufficient to equip the jail in a modern manner.
