**ELEVEN YEARS AGO SMASHED RECORDS**

How This Week Compared with the Temperatures of March, 1906.

Past winters in Butte have recorded lower temperatures than the present winter but the cold weather has never been so continuous as it was since the latter end of the month of October and up to the present.

Those interested in weather statistics and in comparisons of the winter of 1916-17 and former years will do well to glance over the following figures showing the minimum temperatures for nine days, from March 11 to March 19 inclusive, in 1906:

March 11.....	-11

March 13.....	-14
March 14.....	-18

While those are the official figures in the weather records at the Butte Electric Railway company, Rev. E. J. Groeneveld today showed his note book of 1916 and there he had recorded the temperatures given above. That week happened to be the time when a series of revival services were being held at the Immanuel Presbyterian church.

"I attended the services every evening and it was always below zero when we left the church. The services were conducted by Dr. Ray Palmer, and in spite of the frigid weather, the attendance was large and the services very successful. Ten inches of snow fell during the nine days," said Dr. Groeneveld.

The weather forecast for tomorrow is brighter than for several days past. A rising temperature may be expected tonight with generally fair weather tomorrow.

**SEVEN DIVORCES GRANTED TODAY**

Judge Has a Lengthy Session. Neglect Common Cause for Action.

This was divorce day in Judge Lynch's department of the district court and during the morning session, which lasted from 10 o'clock until nearly 1, seven couples were granted their freedom. Minnie Johnson was granted a divorce from Percy R. Johnson on the ground of failure to provide.

Mary V. Watson informed the court that her husband, Allen G. Watson, had failed to provide for her. The couple were married in this city Oct. 27, 1913. The decree of divorce was ordered issued.

Amy Barkla was married to William Barkla in this city in March, 1902, and there is one child. The plaintiff informed the court that her husband had entirely neglected to provide for her for upwards of one year. The plaintiff was given a divorce and also the custody of the child.

Hazel Gavigan said that she was married to Dave Gavigan in this city in August, 1915, and there was one child. The plaintiff said that her husband deserted her more than a year ago. She also added that he was in the habit of visiting dance halls three and four times a week and associating with other women. The decree of divorce was ordered issued and the plaintiff was given the custody of the child.

William Rose was given a divorce from Elma Rose on the ground of desertion.

Mary E. Kinna said that she was married to J. C. Kinna at Spokane, Wash., May 19, 1909, and there was one child. The plaintiff informed the court that her husband was drunk more or less all the time and that when he could not get whiskey he would drink lemon extract or any other kind of an extract he could secure. The property rights were arranged outside of court. The decree was ordered issued and the custody of the child given to the plaintiff.

Eva Morrison said that she was married to Harold Morrison at Banff, Alberta, Canada, June 18, 1913. In November of the same year she said that she had to go to her mother to live as her husband would not support her. The plaintiff was given her divorce and also the custody of the minor child.

**YEAR IN PRISON FOR CARRYING GUN**

Sam Malouis Sentenced After Court Listens to Pleas for Clemency.

Sam Malouis, found guilty of carrying concealed weapons within the city limits, was sentenced by Judge John V. Dwyer this morning to not less than one year nor more than two years in the state prison at hard labor. Before the sentence was imposed Attorney Frank Lenz asked that the judge be as lenient as possible, calling the court's attention to the fact that Malouis, while having the gun in his possession, had only borrowed it for a New Year's celebration. Attorney M. S. Cohen also appealed to the court for leniency, stating that the man had already been confined in the county jail for two months and asked that this fact be taken into consideration when passing sentence.

"I don't think it is a case for the maximum penalty, nor do I think it is a case for the minimum penalty," remarked Judge Dwyer. "The fact is," said the judge, "the evidence showed that the defendant had the gun in his pocket and that it was ready for use on the occasion required. Malouis not only violated the law by having a gun in his possession, but he also violated the law in having a gun in his possession when he is not a citizen. The carrying of guns is responsible for a large number of crimes and murders, and if people persist in carrying guns they must pay the consequence. The sentence of the court is that Malouis be confined in the state prison at Deer Lodge for not less than one year nor more than two years at hard labor."
