

PLEADS GUILTY GOES TO PRISON

Ferris Given Two and a Half Years at Deer Lodge. Other Cases.

Louis Ferris, after being arraigned on a charge of assault in the second degree by County Attorney Joseph R. Jackson, this morning in reply to a question of Judge Dwyer said that he desired to plead guilty and accept sentence at once. He was sent to the state prison for not less than two years and six months nor more than five years. Ferris was charged with having assaulted a section foreman of the Oregon Short Line Railroad company at Feely a short time ago. Ferris came into some prominence about five years ago when he was arrested in connection with the wrecking of a Northern Pacific train near the Montana street railway crossing. When placed on trial the jury disassembled and he was never brought to trial the second time, being released soon after. Albert Hauterich, charged along with Charles Reese, Vernie A. Yeager and Mabel Yeager, with robbery, entered a plea of not guilty and was granted a separate trial. Reese is to appear for plea on Monday, while the pleas of Yeager and his wife were continued for one week.

Reuben Edstrum was arraigned on a charge of robbery and his plea set for next Saturday. His bond was fixed at \$7,500. He is represented by Attorney Nolan and Demovay.

Patrick Sullivan, Gratian Moriarty and Percy Green each entered pleas of not guilty to a charge of robbery and were granted separate trials.

A man who had been arrested under the name of George Thomas on a charge of robbery informed the court that his true name was Michael Barry. He said that he was without means to engage counsel and the court named Attorney Louis E. Haven to look after him. He is to appear for plea next Saturday.

J. P. Emerson was arraigned on a charge of having committed a statutory offense and his plea was set for next Saturday. He is represented by Attorney William Meyer.

Edwin Pearce when called upon to plead to a charge of burglary was represented by Attorney John M. Ward. Pearce said that he wished to plead guilty. County Attorney Jackson said the case was one in which some leniency might be exercised as Pearce was a young man and under the influence of liquor when he committed the act. The county attorney further added that Pearce did not take anything. The judge said that he did not like the idea of sending a young man to the penitentiary, but there was nothing left for him to do. He sentenced Pearce to not less than one year nor more than two years in the state prison.

One day recently, Mrs. Eliza Scandling, aged 78, shown in the center of the picture, thought she would like to have a picture of her direct descendants, especially in view of the fact that the fifth generation has arrived. The baby, Richard Eustice, is seen sitting on the knees of the grandmother, Mrs. R. J. Cooke, 33 years old. The baby's mother, Mrs. Samuel Eustice is seen on other side of the picture. The great grandmother, Mrs. E. J. Williams, stands in rear.

One family in Butte contains a great, great grandmother at 88, a grandmother at 55 and a mother at 29 with a three-months old baby to complete the five generations, all healthy and happy. The picture above tells the story. The great, great grandmother, Mrs. Eliza Scandling, was born in England. Several years ago she emigrated to Michigan with her husband and a daughter, who is Mrs. E. J. Williams, living with her mother at 68 Missouri avenue, the great grandmother of the family. The rest of the family were born in Butte. Mrs. R. J. Cooke is probably the youngest grandmother in the city. She is only 33 years of age and lives at 4 Clear Grit terrace. Her daughter, Mrs. Samuel Eustice, aged 29 years,
