WILL FACE THE HANGMAN WITHOUT WHIMPER, HE SAYS

Sherman Powell Snores Loudly During Night Following Sentence of Death. Will Show "There is One Colored Man Without Yellow," He Says, But Declares the Fight for His Life Will Go on to the Last. His Only Worry is for His Old "Mammy" in Canada.

While the jurors who prescribed death by hanging as the punishment to be meted out to Sherman Powell, were without doubt much agitated during last night over their act in depriving a human being of his life, the condemned man spent the night in sound slumber and kept others in the jail corridor where he was confined awake with his snores. Powell slumbered through the early morning. He was not awake when the other prisoners received breakfast. He awoke about 11 o'clock and sent for his attorney, James B. O'Flynn.

"I don't want any of this sympathy stuff in mine," Powell said. "I was tried by a fair jury and received fair treatment all the way through. My attorneys put up a great fight, but the cards were stacked against me and that's all there is to it."

"My chief worry is about my old mammy back there in Canada. She knows all about the case and she will know within a short time that I am

sentenced to be hanged. If I had a brother or sister to support her, I wouldn't mind so much.

"But I haven't given up the fight by a long way. The case will be taken to the supreme court and my attorneys state they will make every effort for a new trial. I believe that I am a victim of circumstances; that the community is demanding some hangings and that I happened to come along for trial at the wrong time.

"Some people say a colored man is yellow. If the worse comes there won't be a man living that will be able to say that this colored man showed a yellow streak. I'll take my medicine, if necessary, hoping all along that I will get a new trial."

Powell has not yet been removed to a separate cell. The death watch will not be put on in his case until after formal sentence is pronounced by Judge Dwyer.

Powell today stated that he wants to see a Methodist minister. His mother is a member of that church.
