### APPROVE ACTION BY SECRETARY BAKER

Ministers Hold Last Regular Meeting of Present Season.  
The last regular meeting of the season of the Silver Bow Ministerial association today was signalized by the adoption of resolutions commending Secretary of War Baker for the elimination of saloons and immoral houses from soldiers' training camps; President Wilson for his position on prohibition of the use of grain for the manufacture of liquor, suggesting also that grain should not be shipped to Europe for the manufacture of liquor, and United States Attorney B. K. Wheeler for his decision to prosecute to the limit all infringements of the regulation forbidding the sale of liquor to soldiers.  
The organization will hold a special short session next Monday to hear a report from the program committee of a proposed picnic. Progress was reported in the Deaconess hospital movement. Rev. F. A. T. Cornelissen gave a paper on "The Love of God, How Displayed." The members expressed their pleasure at the approaching visit of Dr. Newell Dwight Hills on June 4 in behalf of the Liberty loan movement. Rev. D. N. Anderson presided.

### BOURQUIN ORDERS GRAND JURY DRAWN

Fifty Men Will Be Summoned From Towns Adjacent to Helena.  
Federal Judge George M. Bourquin today ordered 50 names drawn from the list of eligibles for service as grand jurors to report at Helena on June 15. The names will be drawn from the list of eligibles living in towns along the railroad from Helena to Garrison, from Helena to Craig on the Great Northern, from Helena to Townsend on the Northern Pacific and from Helena to Boulder on the Great Northern. The grand jury selected from the 50 will investigate some 65 cases, alleging violations of federal statutes to be presented by the United States district attorney. A majority of these cases charge bootlegging, although one case charging murder on a reservation, and another alleging theft of \$10,000 from the registered mails at Billings, will be proved.  
Trial of the suit of Laura Boomer against James H. Rowe to collect a deficit resulting from sale of lands on which a mortgage was foreclosed was completed in the federal court this morning. Rowe was sued as secretary of the Salmon Land company, mortgagor, and \$5,000 was demanded. The case was submitted and briefs will be filed later.  
Trial of the suit of David W. Symons against Belevor & Brown, an action for a partnership accounting and distribution of the profits resulting from the sale of lots in the Floral Park addition, was started this afternoon.

Local Bankers Start Campaign for Subscriptions to the Liberty Loan.

portion to the population than any other city, and that therefore in view of the fact that assurance of security of the investment is largely responsible for this, Butte should be well represented in subscriptions for bonds, which afford the same security as is afforded postal depositors.  
Details of the bond issue, together with the plan for purchasing them, will be gladly explained by every banker and every bank employe in Butte. Postmaster Goodwin, too, is putting forth extra effort for lack of information concerning the bonds.  
Posters are being displayed in all of the banks and in many of the stores urging purchase of the bonds.  
**Non-Taxable.**  
Local bankers point out the advantages of the non-taxable feature of the Liberty loan bonds. Under present rates of taxation they say that bonds are equivalent to ordinary corporate bonds or other investments bearing 6 1/2 per cent. In addition no federal tax, which war conditions may later make necessary, will affect these bonds. The only tax they are subject to is the inheritance tax, which applies to all property.  
**Postmaster Sells Bonds.**  
The government recently has issued a call to postmasters to assist in selling bonds. Postmaster Goodwin will accept subscriptions just the same as the local banks. Bonds will be issued in denominations of from \$50 to \$1,000, and 2 per cent of the amount subscribed must accompany each application. In other words, \$1 is deposited with an application for a \$50 bond; \$2 for a \$100 bond; \$10 for a \$500 bond and \$20 for a \$1,000 bond.  
**Time to Pay for Them.**  
Completion of payments on the bond is extended over a period ending Aug. 30, a certain percentage being required upon specified dates in the interim.  
One especial advantage no other bonds, national, state, municipal or corporate, have is that if the United States during the continuance of the war shall issue other bonds at a higher rate of interest, holders of Liberty bonds have the right to exchange them for bonds bearing the higher rate of interest, dollar for dollar.  
**Will Help Employes to Buy.**  
In order that all employes may participate immediately in the Liberty loan, Armour & Co. are formulating a plan permitting outright purchase on government terms or on a weekly payment basis, according to announcement received today at the company's local branch. "We wish to make it easy for Armour employes to manifest their loyalty to the government to such an extent as their circumstances will permit," says the announcement.  
**Posters in Windows.**  
Every bank and shop window in the United States is to display posters. Designs for these posters have been approved and delivery started today, the slight delay being due to the lithographic work necessary to produce the colors. These posters will feature an animated picture of the Goddess of Liberty, leaning forward, eyes ablaze, finger pointed, saying to every passer-
