WISCONSIN ALUMNI ANNUAL MEETING

Sessions Will Be Mainly Devoted to Discussion of War Needs.

The University of Wisconsin Alumni association of Montana will hold its sixth annual meeting here Saturday evening. This meeting will be held at the Silver Bow club at 8 o'clock, and will consist of a banquet, followed by a program of speeches and a social session. There are about 200 Wisconsin university graduates in the state of Montana, and it is expected that 30 to 40 will be present at this meeting. The wives and husbands of members of this organization are also invited to be present. A considerable proportion of those attending this meeting will come from outside of Butte. Speeches arranged for comprise the following: "Illustrated Talk on the Northwest," by Oscar Rohn. The illustrations in connection with this talk will be a series of stereopticon views taken of the beauty spots of Montana, Idaho and Washington by Asahel Curtis under the auspices of various good roads organizations and chambers of commerce throughout these states. Dr. Maria Dean of Helena will speak upon the plans of service of the medical profession in the present war. Chancellor E. C. Elliott of the Montana State university will speak upon the opportunities for service in the war. This meeting will be essentially a war meeting where various questions of duty and service will be thoroughly discussed.

It is of interest to note in this connection that at the University of Wisconsin during the first two years of attendance all male students are required to take military drill for two one-hour periods each week. During the past few months the military facilities at Wisconsin have been brought to their fullest usefulness by providing a continuous all-day course of training each day. Students have been allowed to discontinue their regular work and put in their whole time on drilling and military training for which they receive university credit, agreeing to enlist upon completion of this special course. At the present time there are something over 1,000 University of Wisconsin students active in some line of national war service. A census is also being compiled by the university of all male alumni graduating subsequent to 1890.

While some 200 invitations to this meeting have been sent out to the Wisconsin alumni of Montana, it is quite probable that there may be some in this vicinity who have been overlooked. It is desired that this notice may be considered as an invitation to attend this meeting by any Wisconsin alumni who have not been otherwise invited. Alumni election will take place at this meeting. Present officers are: President, Prof. A. W. Richter of Bozeman, and secretary-treasurer, J. H. Warner of Butte.

ALASKA TO SUPPLY HER SHARE OF FIGHTERS

Seward, Alaska, June 1.—Alaskans are already engaged in military activities. From the number of military organizations which have been established in towns from Ketchikan to Nome it is evident that Alaskans intend to do their share in supplying men for the government's fighting forces.

It has been pointed out that the duty of young men in the territory is to engage as vigorously as possible in developing the economic resources of this new land. Fish for food and copper or other minerals for munitions are, it is said, as vital as men for the army.

To this end the territory is preparing to ship ore and fish products in unprecedented quantities, but this does not prevent both the young and old men from drilling.

UNCLE SAM WANTS 15 LIVE ALASKA GOATS

Ketchikan, Alaska, June 1.—Bids have been called for by W. G. Weigie of the United States forest service for the catching of 15 live wild Alaskan goats to be transferred to Admiralty Island. Goats from any part of the territory are desired, the purpose being to stock the island, which is peculiarly suited for raising wild goats, according to the United States biological survey.

The project of securing the animals has been taken up by the Boone and Crockett club of New York City and it is hoped that the animals can be secured this year. Goats are found on Kenai peninsula and along the Alaskan range from Mount St. Elias to Mount McKinley.
