

### G. A. R. READY FOR BIG MEETING

Simon Hauswirth and Others Will Attend Session in Boston.

Fifteen members of the Grand Army of the Republic of the department of Montana will attend the national meeting of the G. A. R. in Boston, commencing on Aug. 20 and lasting for one week.

Among the Montana men who will attend the meeting will be: Simon Hauswirth, Butte, state department commander; George H. Taylor, Helena; Bill Mallahan, Butte; Thomas Williams, Butte; Charles Howe, Butte; C. H. Frady, Helena, and J. R. Goss, Billings.

Orlando A. Somers of Kokomo, Ind. is slated for the next national commander. It has not been decided whether the Butte men will support Mr. Somers' candidacy or not.

### THREATENED STRIKE ON GOVERNMENT JOBS CALLED OFF TODAY

New York, Aug. 10—The threatened strike of carpenters employed in government work in this district on cantonments, navy yard construction and aviation fields was called off today. An agreement was reached after a conference between government officials and labor union leaders under which it was agreed that union hours and wages will hereafter prevail on the work contracted for by the government.

The contractors had objected to the demands of the carpenters' union that no non-union labor be employed.

Chicago, Aug. 10—An increase of from 11 to 15 per cent in wages of 13,000 employees of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad shops was announced here today. The advance goes into effect Sept. 1.

### NIP PLAN TO GIVE CUP TO CAPTAIN OF U-BOAT

Pittsburg, Aug. 10—Enemy alien plans to secretly send a huge loving cup—the gift of pro-Germans in America—to the commander of the U-boat that sunk the Lusitania were believed by federal officials today to have been knocked in the head by the arrest of Otto T. Post.

Post, an expert mechanical engineer employed by the Rust Engineering company, was nabbed by deputy marshals. Among the papers seized were several showing that Post was active in the scheme, it was said today.

### CHANGE TO ARREST SLAYERS IS POOR

Despite Big Reward for Capture, Lynchers Are Still at Large.

Although rewards aggregating several thousand dollars have been offered for the capture of the men who lynched Frank H. Little, I. W. W. leader, no results have been obtained, according to the police. It was reported yesterday that Mayor W. H. Maloney received a telegram from New York signed "J. J. J." delaying local police officers in their search for the slayers of Little. The mayor left the city last night for Buffalo, where he has been sent as a delegate to the national convention of Eagles, and therefore the report could not be verified.

Acting Mayor Hanratty this morning, when he took charge of the mayor's office, declared that efforts to locate the slayers of Little will be continued.

"The city will pay \$1,000 to the person who will cause the arrest and conviction of the men responsible for Little's death," said the acting mayor.

According to Chief Murphy the execution of Little was carefully planned and the murderers left no clue. The print of an automobile tire, the only evidence left behind, was thought to form a valuable clue. Investigation, however, shows there are many of such tires in the city.

### MYSTERY CAR COMES TO STAY IN BUTTE

Announcement is made that the Moore Motor Vehicle company of Minneapolis, makers of the famous "mystery car," will shortly open up show rooms in Butte. One of the "mystery" cars is now being exhibited at the Atwater and Williams garage on West Granite street.

J. W. Platt, fiscal agent for the Moore car, is now in Butte after closing up contracts for 1,000 cars.

The introduction of the Moore to Butte is an important item to many who have been interested in that make of automobile. It has long been a puzzle to many how the automobile, fully equipped, can be sold for \$50.

### REYNOLDS EXPLAINS HIS RACE CONDITIONS

Wagers He Can Make Spokane and Return Within 24 Hours.

Jimmie Reynolds of Boulder Springs, who was in Butte today, explained the details of the race he intends to run to Spokane and return, within the next few days.

"The side bet will be \$1,000," said Reynolds. "I agree to make the distance within 24 hours, barring the usual troubles met with on the road. I won't agree to overcome tacks in the road, placed there deliberately, or any barrier which might be put on the track to delay me in the race."

Reynolds says he will start on the run when the money is put up.

### ALLEGED SPY WILL BE INTERNED UNTIL END OF THE WAR

Seattle, Aug. 10—Ernest Leibold, formerly engaged in the lumber business in British Columbia, was arrested late yesterday at Long Lake, about five miles from the Puget Sound navy yard.

Leibold, who, with Alvo von Alvensleben, Hans Cron and George F. Schlessenborg, all of Seattle, is suspected by the federal government of spy activities covering the northwest, will be interned for the remainder of the war.

Long Lake, where Leibold was taken into custody, is believed to be the headquarters of the alleged spy ring.

### BIG FREIGHTERS SOON TO RETURN TO THE PACIFIC

San Francisco, Aug. 10—Six freight-lifting vessels now operated on the Atlantic coast by the Pacific Lime company are to be brought here soon for service to all parts of the world, it became known today. A number of these boats are steam driven. Others it is expected will be fitted out with steam engines on their arrival here.

The schooner William E. Burnham is already on the coast, and it is planned to convert it into a steam ship on its arrival here from San Pedro. These boats are said to be needed to provide against a lack of bottoms on the Pacific coast.

ENVOYS TO RUSSIA LEAVE FOR HOMES Washington, Aug. 10—Members of the American mission to Russia leave today for their homes, Ellhu Root, its

head, going to New York. All will return later to aid in the work of Russia's rehabilitation. Sending of American troops to the eastern front would not, in the opinion of all the commissioners except Charles Edward Russell, who suggested the plan, be helpful to Russia. On the

contrary, they are convinced that it would prove detrimental. What Russia is most in need of, say the commissioners, is encouragement by the American press and people, particularly as an offset to anti-American propaganda being carried on by Germans in Russia.
