## BUTTE WILL PRAY FOR END OF WAR

### Sunday Set Aside for That Purpose in Mayor's Proclamation.

All people of Butte are urged to pray for the early ending of the war in a proclamation issued by Mayor W. H. Maloney in accordance with the wishes of the president. The proclamation reads as follows:

Whereas, Our country is engaged in the great struggle of democracy against autocracy of humanity against barbarism of right against uprightness of might; and

Whereas, Americans chosen soon will be on the firing line side by side with the sons of our allies offering their lives that freedom may not perish from the earth; and

Whereas, The president of the United States by formal proclamation has set aside Sunday, Oct. 28, as a day of prayer throughout the nation for the success of our just and sacred cause; and

Whereas, Our citizens are accustomed in their daily lives to turn to the Almighty in each hour of trial and confident that God's all-wise beneficence will bless our efforts for the right and strengthen our hearts and hands to carry on the great struggle in behalf of the oppressed and oppressed;

Now, therefore, I, William H. Maloney, mayor of the city of Butte, request our citizens to give heed to the proclamation of the president of the United States setting aside Sunday, Oct. 28, as a day of supplication and prayer, and I earnestly urge that each according to his faith ask for divine guidance and strength in the task which the people of our country have set themselves.

Given under my hand and seal this twenty-third day of October in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and seventeen.

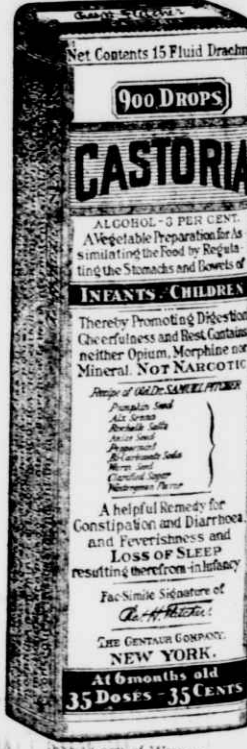

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 24.—Walter Scott, alias "Death Valley Scotty," headed a few years ago as the discoverer of an El Dorado in Death Valley, famous for his prodigality in spending money, weaver of a desert romance that startled seekers of gold all over the world, is working in the Nevada bean fields, near Sacramento, for \$2.25 a day.

Several years ago "Scotty" appeared in Los Angeles in the rough grab of a miner and possessed of a prodigious bankroll of large denominations. He claimed to have discovered a mine in Death Valley and proceeded to scatter huge tips among the bellboys in the hotels. He created a furor across the continent.

From time to time "Scotty" would disappear into the desert and would return with a fresh supply of money. No one knew just how he got the money or where the fabulous mine was located.

On one occasion he entered the bar of a Los Angeles hotel and called for cigars. In payment he offered a \$100 bill.

### Paderewski to Help Collect Data Concerning Polish Politics.

Washington, Oct. 24.—Ignace Paderewski, pianist and leader of the Polish nationalist movement in the United States, will assist Colonel E. M. House in gathering data for use of peace commissioners at the end of the war, it became known today when Colonel House paid another visit to the white house. Mr. Paderewski has established headquarters in Washington, canceled most of his concert engagements and will devote his time to collecting and arranging the mass of details concerning Polish politics, business and nationalist ideals, on which a peace conference would need to be informed before agreeing on Poland's future status.
