COMPLETE CALL OF APPEAL CASES

Judge McClerman Renders Decisions in Matters Under Adversement.

Judge J. E. McClerman today taking his last and most important step in the morning rendered several decisions in cases he had under advisement.

In the case of John J. McHatten against the city of Butte the court found in favor of the plaintiff and against the defendant. This was an enforcement case and the court is of the opinion that the plaintiff is entitled to the attention of the attorney in the fact that in giving the decision he did not wish to be understood as passing upon the legality of the enforcement of the law.

In the case of the Jewel Tea company against H. J. Parnham and others the plaintiff's motion to strike the amended separate answer of A. F. West and Amanda West was granted and it was allowed to further proceed.

In the case of Harry S. O'Neil against the M. J. O'Connell company the defendant's general demurrer to the plaintiff's complaint was overruled and defendant's special demurrer to the complaint was sustained as to paragraph seven and overruled as to the rest.

The judge completed his call of the justice court appeal calendar and set the following cases:

CRIMINAL CASES BEFORE THE COURT

Two Enter Pleas of Not Guilty, County Attorney Files Complaints.

Criminal matters largely occupied the attention of the morning session of Judge J. E. McClerman of the district court today. Zeko Savichevich, who is out on \$15,000 bail, was to have entered his plea to a charge of murder, but a continuance was granted for one week. Frank Riley, charged with burglary, and Dr. John D. Long, charged with practicing his profession without a license, entered pleas of not guilty. County Attorney Joseph H. Jackson filed information today against the following:

- Edward Payne, charged with carrying weapons.
- William A. Foreyth, obtaining money by means of a worthless check.
- Nick Campanello, statutory offense.
- John Doe Harren, burglary, in entering the saloon of John H. Gattner, 245 East Park street, with intent to commit petty larceny.
- Leander Foster and Frank Todasco, robbery, by taking from S. Igaroshe the sum of \$97 by force.

Request Not to File.

Request for leave not to file an information against D. D. McFarland, G. E. Fort and G. E. Lovegrove was granted. In presenting the request not to file, County Attorney Jackson said that he had carefully gone over the transcript of the evidence taken at the justice court hearing and had reached the conclusion that the evidence was not sufficient to warrant a conviction being secured. McFarland, Fort and Lovegrove are the three men who were alleged to have sold to

upwards of 30 Butte people Oklahoma land under false representation. If the people wish to recover their money now they must do it through civil actions.

Request for leave not to file an information against George Carson's was also granted. Carson was given a preliminary hearing in a justice court and the county attorney said that the evidence was not sufficient to secure a conviction.

The following cases in addition to those set for hearing last Saturday were announced:

- Nov. 7—J. P. Emerson, charged with a statutory offense.
- Nov. 9—Alfred Hendrickson, burglary.
- Nov. 12—John F. Sullivan, murder, in shooting and killing William Dezell.

"Furthermore, the problem of ameliorating the prices to the American consumer is entirely involved in our ability to supply the allied needs and still leave us a sufficiency of maintaining the allies in the war from our supplies, without savings, we shall have shortages in the United States that make any hope of peace control absolutely futile.

Blurred for Most of the Misfortunes of Mankind.

That this is the thousandth instance of the kind is not the point. The new six-reel photoplay, "Ignorance," recently produced for the Young Women's Protective League (Co-sponsors with the league, James A. McFarland) has attracted the production for the Famous Feature Film company of Cleveland.

The photoplay with a definite purpose, presents and forcibly emphasizes the cause of the misadventures, namely, the wrong girl's idea that the wrong and misery are visited upon erring girls in some far-away place, usually New York, and thus they are indifferent to evil influences all the more dangerous because they are not recognized in their true meaning. How many young girls know that the ranks of the underworld in big cities are recruited from small towns and even country villages?

As to the story, it is better fitted by long experience and artistic ability for the leading role of the District Attorney could have been secured than Earl Metcalfe, who for four years was leading man and later a director with Lubin, this following seven years as leading man with such stars as Stella Hammerstein and Zilda Sears. Scarcely less important are the two leading female roles in which Eleanor Black and Isabel Tuily do work of big star caliber, together with other members whose conspicuous successes assure a strong production of a strong story, the scenario for which was written by Anthony F. Kelly.
