Poet Calls on Countrymen to Perform Acts of Barbarians.

Washington, Nov. 12.—Publication of a Bulgarian hymn of hate, tending with incitement to cruelty and atrocities, has aroused officials and diplomats here and drawn from the Bulgarian minister, Stephen Panaretoff, the declaration that the purported author, Ivan Arnaudoff, described as "the Bulgarian Pindar," is of no standing to bespeak the national sentiment of Bulgaria.

"To call Arnaudoff 'the Bulgarian Pindar' is to call a very small thing by a very large name," said the minister. "He is connected with the Bulgarian department of education and writes occasionally. He is what you call in America a 'boxer poet'—a scribbler."

"Let not one stone rest on another," says a translation of Arnaudoff's poem to the Bulgarian troops. "Let no one child rejoice on its mother's breast, let no old man lean on its grandson's shoulder. Throw their skulls to the starving dogs. . . . Let there remain on the ruin your hand has sown only skeletons and ghosts. . . . See that decrepit old man who drags his miserable years seeking to cheat death and your soul. Fall him under your boot and with the fork tear out his troubled eyes."

The remainder of the lines are devoted principally to incitement to unpareable excesses of rapine and murder.

MONTANA ENTITLED TO FEDERAL PLACES

District of Columbia Far Exceeds Its Quota—This State Behind.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 12.—Montana politicians will take notice that the state has not received all of the appointments to which it is entitled in the departments at Washington. It is still "shy" 14 appointments which, in the opinion of the practical politician, is enough to make the judicious grievance, especially in view of the fact that the states surrounding the District of Columbia and the District itself have enormously overdrawn their quotas. Montana, according to a statement compiled by the civil service commission, is entitled to 73 places in the departments at Washington and it has received 59 appointments.

On the other hand, the District of Columbia has received twenty-eight times as many appointments as it is entitled to. The District, under the apportionment, is entitled to 84 appointments and it has actually received 2,351. Maryland is entitled to 252 appointments and it has received 730. Virginia is entitled to 491 appointments and it has received 675.

The civil service commission, itself a stickler of the most uncompromising sort for upholding of the laws and regulations, has to admit that in granting the District of Columbia and some states quotas vastly in excess of the apportionment it has side-stepped the provision of the civil service law which says:

"Appointments to the public service aforesaid in the departments at Washington shall be apportioned among the several states and territories and the District of Columbia upon the basis of population as ascertained at the last preceding census."

The commission explains the apparent inequality on many grounds. In the first place it is so easy to pick up competent employees from Washington city and surrounding country, since they are constantly making applications and are within easy reach when wanted. When there is no eligible from a state whose quota is below par it is necessary to fill the existing vacancy by an eligible from some other state, etc., etc.

So it happens that in carrying on the vast war machinery that is being operated through the departments at Washington some sections of the country are grossly over-represented, while others are just as grossly under-represented.

With all the inequality that exists in the present apportionment Washington civic leaders and newspapers, never a bit bashful in trying to gobble everything for the capital city, have actually started a movement to secure the repeal of the provision of law which, theoretically at least, requires an apportionment among the states. The aim of this campaign is to bring about a situation where the entire departmental service, with its army of employees, can be recruited from Washington and vicinity.

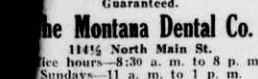
