CONGRESS PASSES THE WAR MEASURE

The Resolution Against Austria Now Goes to President Wilson.

(Continued from Page One.)

against Austria-Hungary and moved its immediate adoption.

Beside the reasons that Austria is Germany's active ally and as such has committed war-like acts against the United States, Senator Stone declared there was the further reason that inasmuch as Italy, France and Belgium comprised one battlefield, American troops might at any time be facing Austrians.

Senator Stone made no reference to Turkish or Bulgarian relations.

"In this great world struggle," said Senator Stone, "all men know of the intimate and apparently indissoluble relation between the governments of Germany and Austria-Hungary."

"The progress of events in Europe, the progress of events in the United States is inevitably as much at war with Austria-Hungary as with Germany. In the circumstances it is impossible that amicable relations between the two countries should be continued."

"The supreme war council has defined battle fronts in Europe, one of which has been defined to embrace France, Belgium and Italy. This search is laid out as one continuous battle front, under one general command."

A Single Front. "I am told that American troops are up to this date massed in France, but if they are operating on one of the battle fronts in Europe, which embrace Belgium and Italy, I cannot see that it would make any difference where American, British, French or Italian troops might for the moment be located. If all of them are co-operating in one general movement against a common enemy, along a single well-defined battle front, is the particular temporary location of one group or another group important? These groups may be shifted to meet the exigencies of war."

"The United States is supporting Italy as well as England, France and those countries in the manner of supporting the United States in war, they all waging against the imperial German government. At that point the United States meets Austria-Hungary and Austria-Hungary is supporting Germany. The two nations are in close contact and in open conflict in the conduct of the war."

Impossible Situation. "Aside from acts of aggression and offense committed by the Austro-Hungarian government against the United States, which in the committee declares to be sufficient cause for war, it is manifestly impossible that the United States and Austria should be at peace while Germany and the United States are at war. The state of actual war already exists between Austria and the United States. It is better for us and for the world that this great fact should be recognized and acted upon affirmatively and authoritatively. National honor and national interests alike demand that this government should assume an attitude of dignity, sincerity and commanding firmness in its international relations."

Debate in the House. Debate in the house on the resolution to declare war on Austria was opened by Chairman Flood of the foreign affairs committee. He asked the house to pass the resolution unanimously. The declaration, he said, was essential to the welfare of the allies and further that Austria in an unrestricted and ruthless submarine warfare had sunk American ships and murdered American citizens.

FEDERAL OFFICERS SEARCH FOR BOOZE

you know what they are digging for," said the soldier. "They are after a cache of booze that dodged the war tax. I understand."

"Where?" was the answer. "If this gets out there will be more prospecting in this place tonight than ever happened in Montana before."

The revenue officer during the search on North Main street intimated that the raid on the alleged cache at that spot was only the beginning of a number of such raids in Butte. It is not known whether other raids will be of the "buried treasure" nature or upon saloons where liquor has possibly been carefully stored around the new war tax provisions.

The ground where the officers are excavating for buried "joy-water" is frozen solid and covered with a light blanket of snow, making the work of digging difficult. The ground seems to have been recently worked over with shovels and picks in a number of places, and the revenue officers at first were in doubt as to the proper place to begin work. Back of the place where the first digging began is a deep gully with the foundations of two or three turn-down buildings around it. The total open space comprises about half an acre.

RED CROSS SENDING TRAINS TO HALIFAX

Complete Staff and Outfit for Hospital Go on One Special.

Washington, Dec. 7.—Arrangements for dispatching a third relief train at 11 a. m. today from New York to carry supplies and assistance to Halifax were made by the Red Cross. Railway officials are assisting and will push the train through as fast as possible.

John F. Moore will be in charge of the Red Cross relief work in Halifax. All supplies will be directed to him and the work of surgeons, nurses and social workers will be under his direction. Surgeons and nurses are being rushed to the scene in three trains.

From Boston a medical base hospital consisting of 15 physicians and 35 nurses has been ordered to Halifax with a full corps of surgeons and nurses whose work will be supplemented by that of an organized body of official workers. The train from New York will not arrive there before midday tomorrow.

INTERMENT CAMP FOR AUSTRIANS IN MONTANA

of Austrian and Hungarian aliens in Montana can be figured.

As soon as the declaration of war against Austria is made the Austrian "alien enemies" will automatically come under the provisions and prohibitions that have already been established for German aliens. As such aliens they will be prohibited from residing or being within certain distances of munition plants and water-fronts and will have to obey the "zone system" recently established by the president.

All German aliens were recently ordered out of the District of Columbia and it is thought certain that a declaration of war against Austria will call for such an order at once against the Austrians.

Former Representative A. Mitchell Palmer, custodian of enemy property, will take over all of the property owned by Austrians who do not live in this country.

No information is given concerning the possibility of the location of any internment camp in Montana, although it is thought certain that the Treasury State will have one such camp at least.

THOUSANDS OF AUSTRIANS AND HUNGARIANS IN BUTTE

The declaration of war against Austria will have far-reaching effect in Butte, where there are at present thousands of unaturalized Austrians and Hungarians. City draft board records show that 432 unaturalized Austro-Hungarians are registered in this city and that 99 men of this race were called and accepted in the first draft. A large number of these 99 men are now in Camp Lewis. About 250 unaturalized Austro-Hungarians are registered in the county and 19 have been sent to Camp Lewis—nearly as can be figured. This number sent to Camp Lewis represents Austrians or Hungarians who passed the physical examinations and who did not file claim to exemption on the ground of alienage.

Local board members have received no word as to the status of these men after war is declared on Austria. Certain it is that no more will be taken into the national army, although it is thought probable that none of the Austrians now in the army will be released unless it is shown that they do not care to fight in Europe against Germany or Austria.

Figuring on the basis of 432 men registered between the ages of 21 and 31, it is estimated that there are more than 3,000 unaturalized Austrians and Hungarians in Butte, and about 1,500 have word as to the status of these men in city of Butte.
