ALL HUSBANDS ALIKE IN LAW

Peculiar Iowa Statute Decided Unconstitutional by Judge Bishop.

HAS BEEN CAUSE OF MUCH TROUBLE LATELY

Punishment Provided in Case of Desertion for Husbands in Families Not in Mental Jurisdiction.

DES MOINES, Sept. 12.—(Special.)—The opinion written by Judge Bishop, declaring the law unconstitutional which the last Iowa legislature adopted to prevent desertions in cases where marriage had been contracted by men to escape prosecution for seduction, has created a sensation in Iowa.
