

POPULISTS DOWNED FUSION

Douglas County Third Party Men Prefer to Make a Straight Fight.

HOT CONTEST IN THE COUNTY CONVENTION

Result Reached by a Decisive Vote and a Full Legislative and County Ticket Nominated—Took Until Midnight to Do It.

The Douglas county populists held their convention at Knights of Labor hall yesterday afternoon and last night. The delegates gathered at 2 o'clock, and it was not until midnight when they adjourned. They nominated a complete ticket of three senators, nine representatives, county commissioner, county attorney and assessors. The convention wrangled all afternoon over a proposition to adjourn until October 4. The delegates who were in favor of adjournment were the democratic county convention were acting under the advice of J. H. Edmiston, chairman of the populist state central committee. V. O. Strickler led the movement for an adjournment, while the opposition was championed by Sam Nedry and Dr. Rodolf. Mr. Strickler made an earnest fight, but was beaten down by the opposition. Nedry and Rodolf carried the day by a vote of 75 to 66.

The refusal of the convention to adjourn was a sore disappointment to a large number of delegates who had expected to meet the democratic county convention in an amicable arrangement for the mutual benefit of both parties.

Campaign in that County Opened at Geneva by the Populist Leader.

OUTDOOR MEETING LARGELY ATTENDED

National Issues Ignored for the More Interesting Topic of Nebraska Affairs—Management of Previous Administrations Timely Touched Up.

GENEVA, Neb., Sept. 15.—(Special Telegram.)—The campaign was opened here today in grand shape by the populists. The announcement that Judge Holcomb would speak in the court house park at 3 o'clock this afternoon drew large crowds. The meeting was held for two hours and was followed by Prof. Jones, populist candidate for state superintendent of public instruction. Judge Holcomb barely touched national problems. He said that the tariff and silver questions were not of deepest interest to Nebraskans. He therefore addressed himself to the discussion of local issues. These were the wise, just and economical administration of the state's affairs and the making and enforcing of such laws as shall do justice to the taxpayers and shall make it impossible for corporations to impose unlawful burdens on the people. He dwelt with emphasis on the fact that the floating indebtedness of the state is rapidly increasing and already far exceeds constitutional limitations. He charged the state affairs to past mismanagement and declared that that party is purposing to elect men who in spirit and method are kin to their predecessors. He made an impassioned, manly address. All did not agree with him, but all admired his spirit. Under the unfavorable circumstances of an outdoor meeting, he was strong wind, he held his large audience remarkably well.

Thurston Democrats Interested. PENDER, Neb., Sept. 15.—(Special.)—The democrats of Thurston county will hold a county convention at this place Monday to nominate a candidate for county attorney, commissioner and clerk. On the evening of September 24 they will hold a convention at this place for the purpose of nominating a candidate for representative of the Sixteenth district. Nick Fritz, Thurston county's present treasurer, will doubtless be the nominee, as the democrats of that district believe Fritz the strongest man they have for the place. SCRANTON GETS SCORCHED

Loss Runs Up to a Quarter of a Million Dollars.

ENTIRE BUSINESS PORTION THREATENED

Three Firemen Fall Through a Roof to the Basement and Are Rescued Only a Moment Before the Walls Fall—One of Them Seriously Injured.

SCRANTON, Pa., Sept. 15.—The most extensive fire, in history of loss, that ever visited this city, broke out yesterday in the business portion of the city. When the flames were brought under control at 10 o'clock, the loss had reached at a conservative estimate \$250,000. For a time it was thought the entire business portion of the city would be destroyed. Flames were first discovered in the basement of Matthew Bros' wholesale and retail drug house, 329 Lackawanna avenue. An alarm was sent in, and when the four companies of the district responded, the building was a mass of fire, and had spread to No. 316, occupied principally by Gross & Foster, one of the largest dry goods stores in the city. Another alarm brought six more companies to the scene. The fire continued to spread, and at 8 o'clock a general alarm brought the entire fire department of the city into service.

Small Fire in an Apartment House at Twenty-Second and Indiana.
