**Omaha Will Have Auto Show.**

Nearly every known make of automobiles manufactured in this country will be on exhibition at the Omaha Automobile Show, which will be held in the Auditorium February 19 to 24. This year's show will compare most favorably with the Chicago show, which will be held the week preceding. Many of the exhibits will be sent down from Chicago, which will put the Omaha affair on an equal basis with the larger eastern shows.

Dealers throughout the country have come to realize that Nebraska offers a territory second to none for the distribution of cars, both pleasure and business. The continued prosperity in Nebraska has created a livelier interest in automobiles and it is for this reason that the coming show should prove the banner one in the history of Nebraska shows.

To accommodate the exhibits, the floor space in the Auditorium will be re-arranged. This new arrangement will provide space for eight additional dealers. The exhibit of commercial cars, which will be much larger, will be confined to the basement, giving the pleasure cars all the first floor space.

The decorations for the 1912 show will be an innovation. An entirely new scheme will be carried out, the management having gone to considerable time and expense to provide a new scheme.
