Elder which are being sent home from the Philippines where he lost his life in the service of his country. The remains will be buried in the National Cemetery at Ft. McPherson. The young man was a corporal in the Third regiment and served in it all during the Cuban campaign. The regiment was sent to the Philippines over a year ago. Young Elder's time expired in May but he felt that his country needed him and re-enlisted the same day that his time was up. His constitution had been undermined by a difficult piece of work his company performed during the Indian troubles in Minnesota after their return from Cuba and the climate in the Philippines caused his weakened constitution to become still weaker and rendered him an easy prey for the disease which caused his death several months ago. Mr. Elder did not know of his son's death until he read his name in the list of dead published in one of the newspapers.
