Shop and Road News.

Lyle Milliken succeeds S. B. Moore as office engineer on the corps of Union Pacific engineers stationed in this city.

One hundred and fifty Japs are occupying bunk cars at Paxton ready to begin work on the double track. The steel and ties are strong from Sutherland to Julesburg.

Supt. H. J. Roth, of Cheyenne, accompanied the Lovett special to this terminal yesterday morning. Engineer Ell brought the train down from Sidney and Engineer Austin made the run to Grand Island.

Two work trains are now in service hauling sand from O'Fallon to fill in the new yards at the western limits of the city. One train ties up at night at O'Fallon the other at this terminal, the two alternating in the lay-over.

A rumor comes from Cheyenne to the effect that George Smith now trainmaster (or rather Asst. Supt.) at that terminal, will soon go to the Illinois Central, a position having been tendered him by Genl. Manager Park.

A special train bearing eastward President Lovett, of the Union Pacific, passed through at eight o'clock yesterday morning. Accompanying Mr. Lovett were Julius Krutchenitta, director of operation and maintenance and General Manager Mohler.

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers has just completed an unusual enterprise in the city of Cleveland. It consists of a thirteen story office building costing about \$1,000,000, erected wholly as an investment rather than as a national headquarters. Every member of the brotherhood has an equal interest in the structure. It is said to be the only building erected on this plan by a labor organization in the world.

It is said by railroad men that the fast running record of 19 minutes between Central City and Grand Island was eclipsed today by No. 11 which made the new record of twenty-two miles in 18 minutes flat. The train consisted of Engine No. 158 and seven cars. Engineer Frank Schmidt, familiarly known among his fellows as "Bootsleather," was at the throttle. Detective Gorman sat in the fireman's seat and says his experience bored on the thrilling "158" is a Baldwin Simple of the Atlantic type.—Grand Island Independent.

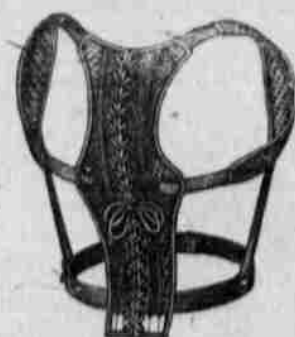
