An Election Necessary

The decision of the Supreme court in declaring the biennial law unconstitutional makes it necessary to hold an election this fall. The entire list of county officers, except Register of Deeds, Clerk of the District Court, County Attorney and County Assessor are to be elected.

From present indications there will be plenty of candidates for the several offices. Republicans with one exception are now holding these offices and if proper care is taken in the nomination of their successors there is no reason why the republican party may not elect their ticket.

There are plenty of men in the ranks of the republican party who are strong and capable to fill the several offices with credit to themselves and the county. If such men are selected to fill these places by the convention their election is certain.

Judging from the proceedings of the State board in the railroad assessment matter, some of the board are influenced more from local interests than from the general interest of the public. This should not be. A man's location should not influence his judgment on the valuation of property.

The decision of the Supreme court declaring the biennial election law unconstitutional came with a surprise to the office holders who had been assured that the law would be sustained, as well as to the office seekers, who had concluded to wait another year before entering the race. The result is all hands will now get busy.

In addition to the nomination of a candidate for judge of the supreme court and two regents of the university, the next republican state convention will have the election of a chairman, secretary and treasurer of the state committee and half of the membership of the committee. One half of the committee is elected each year, the members from the odd numbered districts elected on the odd years.
