THE TRIBUNE has not seen proper to take an active part in politics, this fall, nor to identify itself with either of the tickets seeking the suffrage of the voters of Red Willow county, because the editor had not been in the county sufficiently long to become familiar with the needs of the county, and the characters and qualifications of the candidates. He considered that the intelligent property-owners and tax-payers of the county could make a more judicious selection than could he—a stranger. He apprised the candidates with whom it was his pleasure to meet, of his position, and while stating that he would not personally say anything either in favor or in opposition to their candidacy, the columns of THE TRIBUNE would be open for any honorable use which they or their friends, might desire to make. When the representatives of the people, men of character, ability and intelligence, met at different times, and in opposing conventions, nominated two distinct tickets that received the approbation of the friends of both sides, he felt assured that from the two tickets regularly nominated, the voters would elect officers that would be satisfactory to the majority, and who would strive to administer the affairs of the county to the satisfaction of all. But when a new ticket appears in the field, nominated by a convention of one that met without a call or authority, and in its superior ability and wisdom, ignored the work of the former conventions, and formulated a new ticket, silence is no longer golden. THE TICKET! What a tribute to the brains of the county's representative men! What a colossal monument to modesty(?) Every voter in the county has the right to vote for whom he pleases. It is but proper that he should exercise that right. If he desires to vote for the gentlemen on the revised ticket, let him do so, but let him take either a Republican or People's ticket, and make the alteration he desires, and not soil his fingers by handling a ticket that is an auxiliary to the "one man power," and centralization. There will be but few persons handling the revised tickets on election day, and the few that will handle them will be sore-headed kickers, who will be found in dark alleys and secret places. It is to be hoped that not a single candidate on either of the regular tickets will touch this ticket for the one who does, and it is hard to believe humanity would be so depraved, would be a traitor to the trust reposed in him by his friends, and should be shunned by every honest man in the community. Candidates stand by your ticket, and sink or swim with it!

THE People's Central Committee nominated Elmore Devoe as candidate for County Supt. of Public Instruction in place of Ada P. Buck, declined. Edward Ervin was appointed to fill vacancy in Beaver precinct in the Central Committee.

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AN ANSWER To the Charge of Irregularity in Dr. Green's Nomination.

To the Voters of Red Willow County: A statement having been published in the Indianola Courier, to the effect that Dr. S. L. Green did not receive a majority of all the votes cast in the Republican County Convention, for the office of County Commissioner of Red Willow county. The undersigned delegates to said convention respectfully submit the following statement which is a correct statement of the matter as we understand it.

On the ballot next preceeding the last formal ballot, Dr. Green had eighteen votes, and the other two candidates together had eighteen votes, making thirty-six in all. A motion was then made that the nomination of Dr. S. L. Green be unanimous, which was carried without a dissenting voice, or protest from a single delegate so far as we know, and we fully endorse the action of the convention in his nomination and believe him honestly and fairly entitled to the republican vote of the county.

A LETTER From the Secretary of the County Central Committee.

To the Voters of Red Willow County: Permit me to call your attention to the political situation as it appears from the reports received from the various precincts of Red Willow county, from day to day and time to time since the primaries were held.

Scarcely any strife occurred in nearly all the precincts at the primaries. The convention was harmonious from beginning to end. A ticket was placed in nomination that was generally conceded by the majority of all parties, would give as good satisfaction as any that could have been made; in fact, was considered a very strong ticket. Democrats said, I can support nearly all of that ticket. Greenbackers said, Nearly all of that ticket suits me. So it was generally thought the opposition to the ticket nominated by the Republican Convention would not be strong or united. This brings us to the subject of opposition, in the shape of what was called a People's Convention, held at Indianola, at which the people were represented not by a vote of each and every precinct, through regularly elected delegates; but, by several men who, having failed in finding others, and who were much interested, in their anxiety for office, stirred up a few men in several precincts, and got themselves endorsed, not by men representing all the precincts of Red Willow county, but by men who to a considerable extent openly stated after their convention adjourned, "I was only working for one man in that convention, the rest I do not care anything about, but that one man I shall work for." And such is the case. Every man who was nominated in that convention is talking for himself, and letting the other candidates on the ticket do the same. If he talks up his whole ticket he knows he will be covered up so deep on election day that he can't hope to dig out for so long that he will be glad to forget that an election for County Officers was ever held in Red Willow county, on the 6th day of November, 1883.

He wants office so very much that he is a bolter of everything that does not put him in office, if he is out; and a bolter of everything, if he is not kept in. He is a good republican when he can get office from them. He is a good Democrat, sometimes, not always, and he is above all things, anything and everything, and a good deal of the time nothing, to get office. These matters are common talk. While they work hard for one candidate, they openly say they don't care anything about the rest, which no doubt is very encouraging to the rest of their ticket.

Voters! Do not let men who are so extremely anxious for office, as to almost force themselves upon you, receive your support! To the Voters of Red Willow County: A few of the many reasons why we believe Dr. Green should be elected county commissioner from this district:

The district is comprised of the precincts of Willow Grove, Driftwood and Red Willow. Willow Grove precinct is much the larger of these, and contains more people and property than both the other precincts combined, and is as large, and is increasing in population and property more rapidly than any precinct in the county. Now, this precinct has never yet had a commissioner, while Driftwood has had three, who have held the office more than ten years, and Red Willow has had one commissioner for three years. For these geographical reasons alone it appears to us that this precinct is entitled to the office for the ensuing term. The Republican convention so believing, conceded us the office, and Dr. Green, who was the choice of a large majority of the delegates from this commissioner district, was nominated to fill it. He is the regularly nominated candidate for the office. He is the choice of the district and will undoubtedly receive a very large majority of all the votes cast in this district.

He is a resident of the precinct which is beyond question, entitled to the office. He is a man whom we know, and whom we can trust. A few reasons why we believe Mr. Pickens should not be elected commissioner. 1st. He is a resident of Driftwood precinct, which has had a commissioner for more than ten years continuously. This year, the Republicans in convention conceding the office to another precinct, did not place him on their ticket. Mr. Pickens himself virtually conceded this precinct the commissioner, saying he was not a candidate for re-election; but asking the support of this precinct for Treasurer, which was cordially given him for that office, as is well known, cast our ten votes for him each and every time until the nomination was made.

All these things being facts, it seems hardly fair or consistent for Mr. Pickens to bolt the convention and especially to accept at the hands of another convention and party the nomination for commissioner, the only office sought by our delegates, which was conceded us by the convention.
