Rodarmel for failure to comply with law as to timber-culture entry 964, dated North Platte, Neb., September 10th, 1878, upon the southeast quarter section 9, township 4 north, range 30 west, in Red Willow county, Neb., with a view to the cancellation of said entry, contestant alleging that said Rodarmel has failed to break 5 acres, or any part of said tract from September 10, 1878, to September 10, 1880, or at any time to this date; that he has failed to plant so trees, seeds or cuttings, and to cultivate 5 acres or any part of said tract from September 10, 1881, to September 30, 1882, or at any time since date of said entry; that said parties are hereby summoned to appear at this office on the 26th day of March, 1884, at 11 o'clock, A. M., to respond and furnish testimony concerning said alleged failure.
