TO THE VOTERS OF LINCOLN COUNTY.



In presenting my name to the people of Lincoln County for election to the office of County Commissioner, it is my desire to present to the voters my attitude on the important questions that will be presented to the newly elected board.

Among these probably the most important will be the construction of the new Court House. The County has already voted to levy five mills per year for five years beginning in 1919, and ending in 1924, for the construction of this building. This building should be planned and constructed with the idea in mind that it should serve the people for a long term of years and that it should provide for the coming growth of our county. It should provide not only for adequate and sufficient office rooms but also for rest rooms for farmers and out-of-town tax payers and their families when at the County Seat. It should have an Auditorium for the meetings of Farmers, Business men, the American Legion and similar organizations. And this work should be as economically done as it is possible to do it and secure all the desired objects.

Another of the principal questions is the proper construction and maintenance of hard dirt roads. The Lincoln Highway is now maintained by the state and it is my desire that as soon as possible we should secure North and South routes through the county under the same system. There should be a comprehensive system of highways to each town in the county, built so as to furnish the farmers with the best possible road conditions to their nearest trading point. It is my belief that all culverts and improvements on roads should be of a permanent nature.

Districts Number Two and Three are each at this time receiving only one third of the County Road Fund and they contain over 90% of the roads. It is my opinion that District Number One should be extended so as to include all the roads which are directly tributary to North Platte, or that the funds of District Number One should be used to maintain these roads as far as may be right and proper.

The finances of this County should be handled the same as the finances of any other large business organization and should be fairly and honestly handled. I stand for all of these principles and respectfully solicit your vote at the November election for County Commissioner District Number One.

COURT HOUSE PLANS PROBABLY WILL BE POSTPONED.

Two of the three County Commissioners are to retire the first of the year and new men will take their places. The opinion of these men is that they should leave the building of the new Court House to their successors. They base their belief on the idea that building material and labor will be cheaper next year. Then they think it would be better to collect a good part of the tax with which to pay for the Court House before contracts are let rather than have the contractor set a price on the building in the expectation of having to wait for his money. Both of these are good reasons which will have to balance the inconvenience of using the present building an extra year.

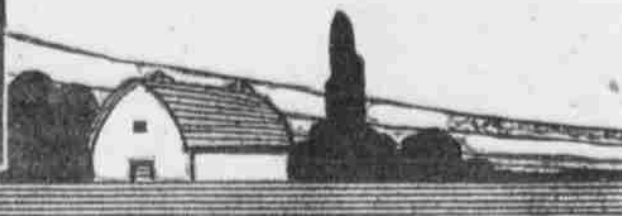

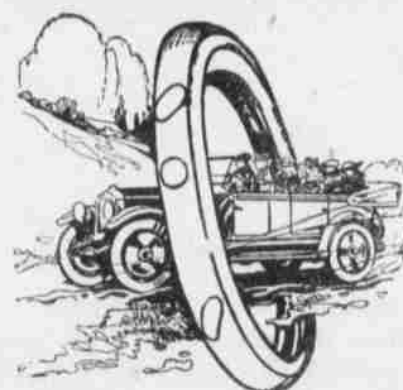
MOTHERS ENTERTAIN THE FOOTBALL BOYS AT A BANQUET WEDNESDAY.

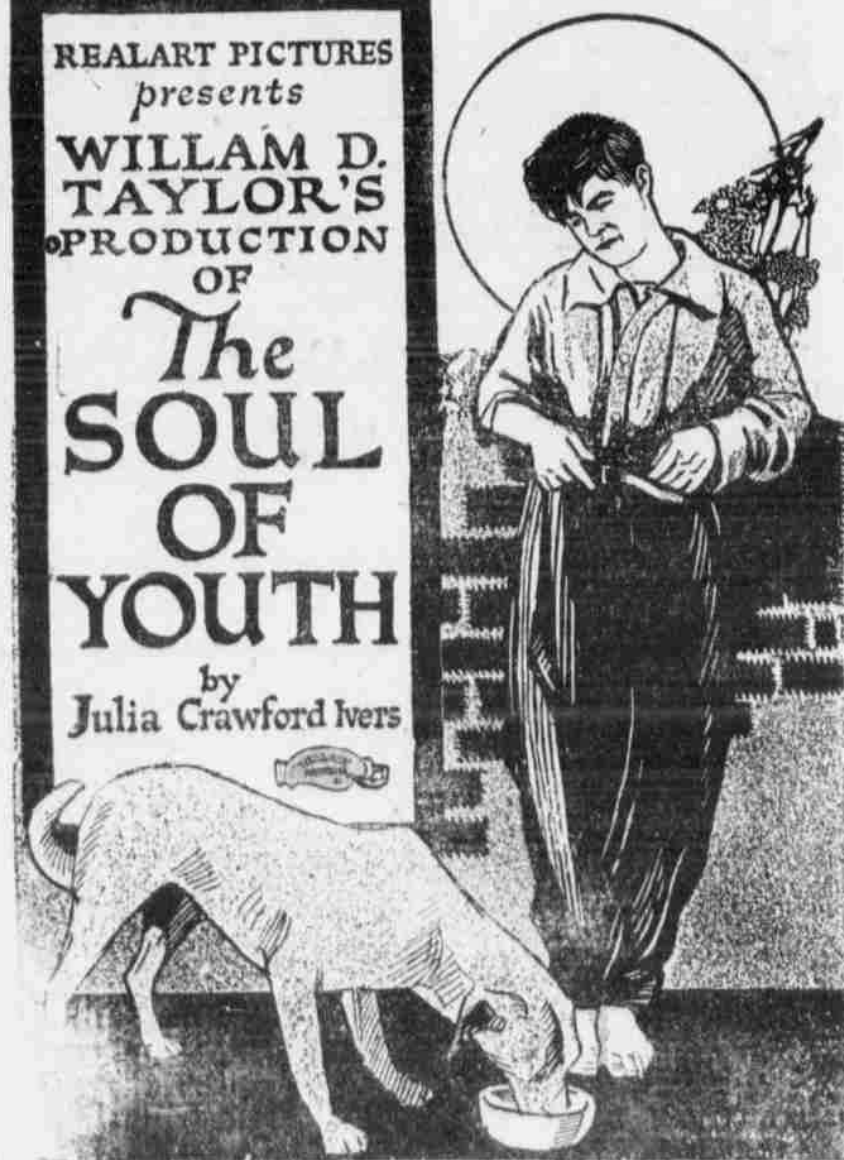
