

ATTORNEY SAYS NO EXTENSION OF POWERS OF STATE RAILWAY COMMISSION.

The following letter from Mr. Shuman is of interest to the people of the city and for that reason we print it in full:

"Editor of Tribune:—
Corporation never sleep, but the people oft times do. If we thought the rate question was closed when the Council turned down the Company's request for an increase, we made a mistake. It looked like this was the end of it, but last week a bill was introduced in the Legislature to give the State Railway Commission power to fix these rates. And even in North Platte papers the North Platte Light & Power Company has the nerve to request by an advertisement that we being partial, request the legislature to give them an impartial jury—the State Railway Commission, to decide all issues relating to rates and service—to take control of the regulation of public utilities. They will have a powerful lobby in the legislature to accomplish this result.

"The State Railway Commission is a body that has granted all the rate increases to the telephone companies and other bodies in the State of Nebraska. If this bill becomes a law, we will no longer have the situation in our own hands, but will be forced to go to a board at Lincoln.

"The way to stop this, of course, is to kill this bill and we can do this by exercising our influence upon the members of the legislature. The advertisement tells us to write our Senator and Representative that we favor this kind of a law. Shall we do it? The North Platte Light & Power Company has a plant in North Platte and another one in Columbus. North Platte is several times as large as Columbus, but in that city they charge but nine cents for electricity, while they charge us 12 cents. They asked the mayor and council there to give them a 20% increase in electricity rates, but even then that would not bring the rate up to what they charge in North Platte. This rate increase was denied by the mayor and council of Columbus. Shall we sleep until this bill becomes a law and then find we are helpless in the matter? If these corporations ask for this kind of a law, we can easily know it is just what they want.
