WHAT THE CAMP FIRE GIRLS STAND FOR AS SHOWN IN THEIR CALL TO SERVICE

Camp Fire is an organization of girls who live near enough together so that they can work and play together readily in each other's homes.

Camp Fire is an organization for finding the romance, the beauty and adventure in everyday life. It makes the homely task contribute to the joy of daily living.

Camp Fire Girls learn to share—to work together, to play together. Mothers and daughters are helped to a better understanding of each other through the sharing, not only of the task, but of the interest—by working together. Filling a regular position for four months, earning ten dollars a week or less.

Saving ten per cent of our allowance for three months.

CHRISTMAS DAY IN AFRICA

Pretty Picture of a Charming Abode in the Hills Above the Old Town of Algier.

Christmas day in Africa! And what a dream of beauty and color, blue sea, blue sky, groves of eucalyptus and olive trees, climbing roses, white-robed Arab women closely veiled, their eyes only showing, bare brown legs and feet, sometimes a silver bracelet on one leg, donkey boys with a nondescript, flowing garment, a red fez on their heads; color everywhere. Our villa is charming, stands in a little wood of eucalyptus trees, with a big garden, balconies, terraces and marble steps, large, high rooms and lovely views on all sides, Mme. Waddington writes from Algiers to Serbiner's. It is quite in the country, five or six kilometers from Algiers, very high up in the hills. Very few people live in the town and the whole hillside is studded with villas. Moorish almost all, dazzling white, flat roofs and narrow windows. Quite at the top, where we are, there are some very comfortable Eastern modern houses. I am writing at my window, which gives on a terrace, from which there is a divine view of the sea and the snow mountains of the Djurjura, miles away in Kabylie, and from one corner through the faded drooping leaves of the eucalyptus I have a glimpse of the town of Algiers, lying a long, white streak far below.

The drawing-room is a delightful room—runs all the width of the house, with windows on three sides, so that we always have the sun. The furniture is sketched, not much of it, and what there is is very ugly, but when the Paris cases arrive, with a few tables and chairs and silver, the room will look very different. There are some carpets in the house, which are absolutely necessary, as all the floors are tiled. However, Charlotte has done wonders with the meager material she has.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

BE IT KNOWN: That we, the undersigned, do hereby in pursuance of the laws of the State of Nebraska, associate ourselves together as a body corporate in manner and for the purpose herein after set forth.

I.

The name of this corporation shall be the Platte Valley Poultry Breeders' Association.

II.

The offices of this association shall be kept in the city of North Platte, Nebraska, and the principal place for the transaction of its business shall be in Lincoln County, Nebraska.

III.

The term of the existence of this association shall be twenty (20) years.

IV.

The Capital stock of this association shall be one Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) divided into shares of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) each, of which capital stock at least Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) shall be subscribed and fully paid before the commencement of the business of this association, and no stockholder shall be allowed to hold or be the owner of more than one share.

V.

The object and general nature of the business to be transacted by this association, and for which it is being created shall be to place on public exhibition or show, poultry for the purpose of demonstrating and encouraging poultry breeders to raise a higher standard of poultry perfection and egg productions.

VI.

The business and affairs of this association shall be managed and directed by a board of directors to be elected by the stockholders from among their number and not otherwise, which election shall be by ballot, each stockholder having but one vote, and which election shall be held on the date of the organization of this association, which board of directors shall elect and choose from their number a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and all elections for directors thereafter shall be held annually on the first Saturday of February at the office of this association.

VII.

The Stock-holders at any annual or special meeting election may adopt any by-laws for the guidance and direction of said board of directors as may be deemed proper by a majority of the votes cast at such election, and a majority of said board of directors shall constitute a quorum to do business, and said stockholders shall be entitled to one vote only and the right to vote by proxy properly authenticated will be lawful.

VIII.

The board of directors shall have the general management of the business of this association, and are limited in their authority as to contracting any indebtedness over and above the cash in the Treasury.
