TIME FOR NATIONAL ACTION

Exploiting for Profit a So-Called Cure for Consumption.

FRIEDMANN AND HIS SERUM

German Doctor's Plan of Marketing His Goods and Necessity for Approval by the Government.

Dr. Friedrich Franz Friedmann declares that he has a cure for tuberculosis. It consists of a serum, which is called "tuberculin vaccine." He made many experiments with it in Berlin before coming to this country, but refused to divulge the secret of its preparation to the German government, giving as a reason that it was not likely to receive proper consideration. Dr. Friedmann arrived in this country several weeks ago. He did not avail himself of a spectacular offer of \$100,000 for the cure of a single individual. He operated on many consumptives before audiences of physicians in New York and elsewhere. Some of his patients have since died, although no conclusion can be deduced therefrom, as they were in the last stages of the disease. No cure has been reported. This again means lit-

tle, for there has not been enough time for any patient to recover, according to the promise of the remedy. Several have been reported as benefited, but whether the improvement was psychological in its origin or due to the serum cannot be said. All that is known definitely is this: Dr. Friedmann claims to have a cure for tuberculosis. The burden of proof is on him and he has not established it. It may be a beneficial treatment; it may, on the contrary, be positively dangerous to patients.

Exploiting the Serum. The ethics of the profession require that the benefit from the discovery of a great curative remedy, or a specific should be straightway given to the world, although financial profit to the discoverer may likewise be projected. Dr. Friedmann proposes to retain his proprietary rights, accepting as a royalty for the use of the serum a cash payment of \$125,000 and \$1,600,000 in stock of thirty-six institutes to be established in different parts of the country for the treatment, by his method, of tuberculosis. This implies his own faith in the cure, for he might easily have sold his rights for \$500,000 or more in cash. It should be pointed out, however, that the extensive advertising the serum has received will likely make the earnings of the institutes enormous in the beginning, whether the "cure" is a cure or not.

This is a capitalization of the deposit of millions of human beings, for there is no tubercular subject who would not grasp at a straw, no one who would not spend his last cent at the mere promise, apparently plausible, of a cure. The exploitation of these people without benefit to their health would be more than a tragedy; it would be a crime, and the culpability for it would rest absolutely on the United States and the state governments. The very disappointment of their hopes, to say nothing of their financial losses, might dissipate the strength of thousands of sufferers and raise the mortality from tuberculosis tremendously.

Efficiency Needs Demonstration. The company should be prohibited from the exploitation of the Friedmann serum until its efficacy has been absolutely demonstrated, until it has been proved that it is not a specific it is at least curative or prophylactic in tendency. Experiments under the direction of the United States government, or coincidentally under the direction of the several states, should be a prerequisite to the marketing of it. The misery of the nation cannot be coined into dollars unless amelioration is an absolute certainty. The injection of no serum into human blood, on a vast scale, can be permitted, even for nothing, until it is shown conclusively that no harm can result.

If Dr. Friedmann has a cure there are a multitude of philanthropists in this nation willing to pay him one or two or three or ten millions for his secret, if the government itself would not. The world is ready to recompense him and devote his discovery to the good of humanity. He prefers, however, to retain his rights and determine for himself his financial return. The people of this nation, therefore, must insist on the enforcement of their rights. They must demand the government's stamp of approval on this product before they purchase; they must not be permitted to buy until that approval is given.—Philadelphia Public Ledger.

MUCH LAND AWAITS EXPLORER

One-Eighth of the Globe Remains a Closed Book to Civilization. Perhaps one of the most interesting and least known countries on the face of the globe, and one which has so far pretty successfully defied civilization, lies secreted among the Himalaya mountains. Authorities say that it is presided over entirely by women, who are responsible for such rude laws as are necessary even in a lawless district, manage the affairs of state, and live in a luxury of inverted Mormonism by possessing four or five

Not a single river is estimated to flow throughout its entire 40,000 square miles. Although the famous El Dorado, Peru, which set the sixteenth century ablaze, has never been unearthed, the country might fittingly be called El Dorado, from the rich minerals and priceless stones which emanate from there. Strange, wild-eyed men occasionally descend from the mountains and bring wonderful fragments with them, but they refuse to act as guides to those who would accompany them back.
