WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 .- "The United States should either submit the Panama free toll question to impartial arbitration or retire from the position we have taken," was the declaration of Senator Root in the senate today in a speech favoring the repeal of the free toll provision of the new Panama canal act. Senator Root took the position that congress should not have passed a law last summer that discriminated against foreign shipping and granted free tolls to American coastwise shipping. action, he declared, had been a source of "great regret to multitudes of our fellow citizens," and bad "created a pain-
