

OMAHA CLUBS QUIT NATIONAL ORDER

Local Federation of Child Conservation Leagues Do Not Favor Book Buying Item.

QUESTION EXISTENCE OF BODY

The local Federation of Child Conservation Leagues will sever its connections with the so-called national organization. This action was taken at a special meeting held Thursday at the Young Women's Christian association, and follows the exclusive announcement of The Bee that Omaha members were questioning the existence of the National League, as it was represented to local women by Miss Charlotte White and a corps of assistants who organized this league in Omaha last summer while taking orders for books for the Howard-Severance company of Chicago. The purchase of a set of books from this concern at a price of \$15 or the payment of an equal sum for an initiation fee are included in the requirements of the constitution for membership in the league.

With Withdrawal from National. The Omaha federation will withdraw from the national organization and will select a new name. It will probably be known as the Federation of Omaha Mothers' Club, says Mrs. H. S. Nelson of the Harrison Park circle.

According to the members, payments upon the books ordered will be continued under terms of the contract, notwithstanding dissatisfaction with them. Mrs. Bruce McCulloch of South Omaha, said she considered the contents "a string of platitudes." Others, however, have expressed themselves as contented with the books, but do not want to be in an organization to promote a book concern.

It is said all letters sent by local officers to the national officers have invariably been answered by the Howard-Severance Book company.

Mrs. J. E. Butler, president of the Hanscom Park circle, said that "a sarcastic" letter had been received by the Omaha women from the book concern, following the publication of the situation in the local league by The Bee.

Program on Child Labor to Be Given at the Court House

In connection with the child labor exhibit sent out by the national committee, and which will be installed Sunday at the pioneers' room in the court house, the social science department of the Omaha Women's club will have a child labor program Monday afternoon. Mrs. P. H. Cole of the state committee will be in charge of the meeting.

Miss Josephine Eschenbrenner, membership secretary of the national committee who will be in charge of the exhibit, while it is in Omaha, will talk on the pending federal child labor law. Dr. D. E. Jenkins of the University of Omaha and a member of the school board will talk on "The Economic Situation of Child Labor and Its Relation to Unemployment." E. D. Gepson, chairman of the state child labor committee, will have as his subject "The Child in Relation to Street Trades," and Paul S. MacAulley will tell about the local situation. Mrs. F. A. Follansbee is leader of the department.

Mr. Gepson has also called the annual meeting of the state committee during this exhibit to take place Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Heretofore these meetings always have been held in conjunction with the annual charities and corrections conference.
