CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Resolution to Repair North Sixteenth Street Voted by Mayor.

CONTRACT BEYOND LIMIT OF CHARTER. Work is Partly Done Because Contractor Did Not Wait for Concurrence by Mayor in Council's Action.
