COAL MINER FILES CHARGES

Independent Owner of Anthracite Mines Says Railroads Discriminate. ASKS GOVERNMENT TO INVESTIGATE. Alleges that Roads Have Divided Tonnage and Refuse to Deal Fairly with Those Not in Agreement.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—A complaint was filed with the Interstate Commerce commission today by Edward J. Aden of Boston, Mass., against a number of anthracite coal carrying roads, alleging that their rates for transportation of anthracite coal in certain sections of the anthracite region in Pennsylvania to New York, New England, Maryland and the District of Columbia are unreasonable, unjust and discriminatory against the independent coal producers.
