Remains of an Old Town. Relics of a prehistoric town inhabited by mound builders have been discovered in Montgomery county, Indiana. State Geologist Blatchley has received analyses of various articles. The archeological collection is superior to any in the world. It comes from the farm of J. H. Allen, which he and Winton Utterback have been years in exploring. In the course of their research, without opening the mound to any considerable extent, they have discovered an axe, fifteen arrowheads, a ceremonial stone and utensils for making bowstrings.

The ax is a big one, much too large, and unyielding for use in war. The ceremonial stone is the relic that has taken the fancy of the state geologist. It is a smooth piece of stone resembling a double-headed axe, with two grooves cut in the blades, but an uninitiated observer might take the stone for the petrified vertebra of some monster fish. Mr. Blatchley says he believes this to be the finest of the kind in the world.

The utensil for making bowstrings is a flat piece of slate, with two tapering holes of different diameters running through it. It is supposed that the inventors of this article used it for making deerkin things into bowstrings.—Chicago Chronicle.

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Supreme Court Syllabi. The following opinions will be officially reported: 1210. Wilkins against Redding. Error from Douglas. Reversed. Gilmanville, C. Division No. 1.

Where personal property is pledged to secure the payment of a debt, the pledgee cannot recover the property in a replevin action without paying or tendering the whole amount of the debt and keeping good the tender.

Where the amount of a debt is not in dispute a tender of the amount is not required because coupled with the return of the property, but must be kept good though it may still be on the same condition, but where the amount of the debt is in dispute, a tender of any sum less than that claimed by the pledgee, though equal to the amount claimed, is not good if coupled with such a condition.

A pledgee does not forfeit his lien by unsuccessfully contending that the equity of redemption has been extinguished by contract, or by a sale under his right as pledgee.

1224. Union Pacific Railway Company against Howard county. Appeal from Howard county. Former judgment vacated and judgment of the district court reversed with instructions. Albert, C. Division No. 2.

The authority of a county board to assess taxes is limited by section 5, article 12, Constitution to 15 mills on the dollar valuation, except for the payment of indebtedness existing at the adoption of the constitution, unless authorized by a vote of the people of the county.

A county board assessed a tax of 35 mills on the dollar valuation and 3 mills to pay money indebtedness. In addition thereto it assessed 4 1/2 mills on the taxable property of one of its precincts, the county not being under any obligation to pay for the erection of public buildings, erected in public buildings.

1244. Williams against Fuller. Error from Franklin. Former judgment vacated. Judgment of the district court affirmed. Pound, C. Division No. 2.

An assignment that "the court erred in excluding from the testimony proof as to the truth of the charges made thereon" is too general and indefinite to be entitled to consideration where a portion of the testimony offered in support of the charges was excluded.

The answer in an action for libel alleged, among other things, that the article complained of was not published or concerning the plaintiff, and that it was true. Held, that these allegations must be construed so as to be consistent, and hence that evidence that the charges contained in such article were true of the plaintiff was properly excluded.

1252. Bull Bros. against Powell. Error from Hamilton. Reversed and action as to Bull Bros. dismissed. Hastings, C. Division No. 1.

To authorize a joinder of parties as defendants under Rule 10, it is necessary that the joinder be in the subject matter of the action.
