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### OMAHA BOYS OUTCLASSED

Lincoln High School Scores Twenty-six to Nothing for the Metropolitan.

### CAPITOL CITY BOYS SCORE AT WILL

Through the Line or Around the Ends is All the Same to Them, Though Omaha Takes a Brace in Second Half.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Nov. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—It was the same old story, for the same old reason, in the Lincoln-Omaha high school football game at F. & M. park today, 26 to 0 in favor of Lincoln, and from the time the two teams mixed after the first kickoff it was just a question of how long the Omaha boys would have to last. For end runs, through the line or quarterback plays Lincoln was terrific. Its formation was made with dazzling rapidity. Omaha offered good resistance, and played hard, but the two teams are not in the same class. Both teams tried punting often, but in nearly every instance Omaha gained nothing by this, while with Lincoln it was just the reverse. In the matter of penalizing, both teams got about the same, and this was given them often. Lincoln had bad luck in kicking goal. Avery landing just once. The boys lost their chance at goal because once Referee Hinger dropped the ball while bringing it from behind the goal, and Empire Whipple interpreted the rules that the team lose its kick at goal. Penalties of fifteen and twenty yards were not uncommon. Sensational plays began with the game when Cameron for Lincoln in less than five minutes of play made a twenty-yard run for a touchdown. In seven minutes more Avery kicked goal from the fifteen-yard line. The third touchdown was made by Cameron after a five-yard plunge through the line. For the fourth goal Corner made a beautiful forty-five-yard run around the right end, but by this time the

star work of the home team was beginning to become monotonous.

In the second half Omaha took a brace and held the Lincoln boys well, they only making one touchdown, the ball being on the Omaha five-yard line when time was called shortly before 6 o'clock. The game was called at 3:30, after considerable wrangling as to whether H. H. Putnam of Omaha should play, he having attended the university for a portion of the first term. ### CHAMPAIGN, ILL., Nov. 14.—The University of Illinois lost its last game of the season to the University of Minnesota, 32 to 0.
