DIETRICH TO START TODAY

Will Ask Judge Munger to Fix Date of His Trial as Early as Possible.

IOWANS UNABLE TO AGREE ON A JUDGE

Delegation Will Remain in Washington and Keep on Ballotting Until All Are United Upon One Man.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—(Special Telegram.)—Senator Dietrich will leave tomorrow morning for Nebraska. He will go directly to Omaha, where he will meet a number of his friends. It is Senator Dietrich's determination to ask Judge Munger for a speedy trial in view of the fact that as a senator of the United States the commonwealth which he represents needs his presence in the national capital at this time. The senator stated tonight that he had not yet selected his attorney. He would be guided by conditions as he found them when he reaches Nebraska. Personally he had in his mind one or two men whom he had through confidence in, but that for reasons which were wholly personal he would not decide the attorneyship matter until he reached Nebraska.

The senator, in speaking of his determination to return to Nebraska, said he hoped it would not be thought that he was returning because public prints had announced that Mr. Summers was coming to Washington. "Personally," said the senator, "I have no knowledge as to that which brings Mr. Summers here at this time. I want to go to Nebraska for the purpose of finding out whether there are twelve men who believe in the quality of soil in Iowa. I shall do everything in my power to advance the trial of my case and I will not be satisfied until the issues involved are joined."

No Agreement on Judge.

The Iowa delegation after eight ballots today adjourned without any determination for the Shiras succession. The conference met at 3 o'clock and after two hours of fruitless balloting adjourned until Monday. Several of the members who had thought of going home during the interim decided to remain in Washington and if possible aid in agreeing upon a name to be nominated for judge of the northern district of Iowa. So far as could be ascertained there has been no change in those supporting the several candidates. The Iowa delegation is a close corporation. While they may know who is finally to be agreed upon for Shiras' successor they have not permitted the impression to become general. Wright and Healy still lead, and it is believed that one of these men will be selected.

Bills for Benefit of Wyoming.

Representative Mondell today introduced a bill granting to the state of Wyoming 50,000 acres of land to aid in the construction, enlargement and maintenance of the Wyoming State Soldiers' and Sailors' home, also a bill appropriating \$100,000 for the purchase of a site and the erection of a public building at Rawlins, Wyo.

BRINGS IN EIGHTEEN BILLS

Grand Jury Indicts for Alleged Bootlegging and Abuse of Mail.

MOST OF WITNESSES GO TO HOMES

James T. Walker of Lincoln and F. J. Harrison of Kearney Charged with Violating Civil Service Laws.

The federal grand jury submitted a report to Judge Munger last evening about 5 o'clock in which eighteen indictments were returned. Three of these were for improper use of the mails and fifteen for selling liquor to Indians. In the latter fifteen cases none of the indicted parties is yet under arrest and their names are withheld pursuant to the custom of the United States courts until the parties are either arrested or have given bonds for their appearance.

James T. Walker of Lincoln and F. J. Harrison, now in custody at Kearney for using the mails for blackmailing purposes. The three parties indicted is still at large and hence his name is suppressed for obvious reasons.

The grand jury will reassemble at 9 o'clock this morning for the further consideration of bootlegging cases.

No further indictments were returned in the postoffice scandals at Alma, Orleans, Arapahoe or Oxford, and no further investigation will be undertaken in those cases until the return of District Attorney Summers from Washington.

Most of the witnesses in the postoffice cases have returned to their homes with instructions to return to Omaha by Tuesday morning, at which time the investigations will be resumed before the grand jury.

until 3 o'clock in the afternoon, when a document was drawn up and signed by all the commissioners, setting forth the details of the conference. General Bolgoin of the Colombian commission asked finally if the Colombians could do anything whatever to regain the Isthmus and Senior Arias answered that it was decidedly impossible. He, however, expressed the desire of the Isthmians for close and friendly relations with Colombia.

The questions of Colombia's recognition of the Republic of Panama and Colombia's possible equity in the canal, railroad and other interests on the Isthmus were not broached.

General Reyes is what is termed locally "president in campaign of Colombia." The power with which he is vested was conferred on him by President Marroquin.

The reports emanating from Buena Ventura of the conditions in the Departments of Cauca and Antioquia appear to have been exaggerated. The last reports from these departments do not bear out the sensational stories. Senior Biscamante is the liberal leader and Senior Ospina is the conservative leader of Antioquia. There has been a limited discussion on the part of the liberal and other discontents in Antioquia and Cauca of inaugurating a revolutionary movement. Such talk may be expected at any time in almost any department of Colombia. The liberal revolutionary party is still strong and Panama's success was bound to stimulate such talk.

General Reyes to Visit Washington.

General Reyes says he will proceed to Port Limon and from there to Washington. But otherwise he is silent regarding his intentions.

The Colombian commissioners asked permission to disembark for a promenade through the streets of Colon. Governor Melendez communicated this request to the members of the Junta and it was promptly granted. Then the Panamanian and Colombian commissioners left the walk to the end of the dock, where 100 soldiers of the new republic formed in two lines and presented arms. As the commissioners passed through the lines drums were beaten and bugles sounded. The members of the party then seated themselves in carriages and drove through Colon to the guard, returning to the Canada after an hour. In every way the Colombian generals were treated as friends.

affirm the right to take in freemen, engineers and many others. Later the executive council offered a report in the case of the trouble between the brewery workers and the brewers and engineers, recommending that the Cincinnati agreement be reaffirmed and exonerating the Brewery Workers' International union from any charges which have been made against it. The question led to a general discussion. By a show of hands the committee report was adopted, 101 to 11.

GERMAN STEAMER STOPPED

The Navy Department received a cable-

gram from Admiral Coughlin at Colon replying to an inquiry whether there was any truth in the report that the German steamer Markomannia and Scyllia had been stopped at Colon by American men-of-war.

Admiral Coughlin states that the Markomannia stopped off Colon enroute to Cartagena to land passengers, but was not interfered with. The Scyllia arrived about sunset, three days overdue; was informed that no armed force would be permitted to land, but the vessel was not interfered with, and only darkness prevented its getting alongside the dock at once.

Text of Important Articles.

Although the Hay-Banau-Varilla treaty has in substance been published in their entirety, the Associated Press publishes herewith the text of the first five articles of the convention which have to do with sovereignty.

Article 1.—The United States guarantees and will maintain the independence of the Republic of Panama.

Article 2.—The Republic of Panama grants to the United States in perpetuity the use, occupation and control of any other lands and waters outside of the zone above described which may be necessary and convenient for the construction, maintenance, operation, sanitation and protection of the said canal or any auxiliary canals, locks or other works necessary and convenient for the construction, maintenance, operation, sanitation and protection of the said canal.

Article 3.—The Republic of Panama grants to the United States in perpetuity the use, occupation and control of any other lands and waters within the limits of the zone above described, and in addition the use, occupation and control of any lands and waters which said lands and waters are located in the entire exclusion of the exercise by the Republic of Panama of any such sovereignty, rights, power or authority.

Article 4.—As rights subsidiary to the above grants the Republic of Panama grants in perpetuity to the United States right to use the rivers, streams, lakes and other bodies of water within its limits for navigation, the supply of water or water power or other purposes, so far as the use of the said rivers, streams, lakes and bodies of water and the waters thereof may be necessary and convenient for the construction, maintenance, operation, sanitation and protection of the said canal.

Article 5.—The Republic of Panama grants to the United States in perpetuity a monopoly for the construction, maintenance, operation of any system of communication by means of canal across its territory between the Caribbean sea and the Pacific ocean.
