Stubbs reports to no official of these lines, but direct to the chairman of the board of directors in New York, Mr. Harriman, him-

In the accounting department of the Harriman system the business has been placed in complete charge of Erastus Young as auditor. In addition to the lines named above over which the authority of Mr. Stubbs as traffic director is supreme, Mr. Young also has charge of the accounting department of the Chicago & Alton. ffices of Mr. Young are located in the Union Pacific headquarters in this city.
