"Some Present Day Ideals in Education" was the subject taken by Dr. Butler for his address, who spoke in part as follows:

What is Education? The notion that education is a thing to be definitely included in a few of the earlier years of life and then to be regarded as forever over and done, is a notion entirely outgrown. We have come to regard education rather as a continual enrichment of the resources of the individual. As such, it is just as much the concern of the adult as of the youth.

FIGHT FOR STATE MARSHALS. Club Formulates Bill and Will Have Lobby to Push it at Legislature. DEMOCRATS MAKE NO NOMINATION: Stock Dealers and Shippers Hold Convention and Demand Better Rates and Facilities for Handling Stock and Return Passes.

The democratic city convention was held in Des Moines today, or rather organized at the morning session, and then adjournment was taken until January 30, when it is intended that the ticket shall be named.

KEOKUK, Ia., Jan. 21.—A repetition of last summer's flood seems probable. A gorge has formed at the mouth of the Des Moines river and the water has backed up over miles of lowlands in the Missouri and Iowa bottoms. The Fox river has overflowed its banks. Indian Grave levee, just south of here, on the Mississippi, and the Iowa lake levee broke today, causing heavy losses to farmers having land in wheat. The ice still holds in the Mississippi, but the water has risen two feet in twenty-four hours.

DES MOINES, Ia., Jan. 21.—(Special.)—A meeting of the State Marshal club was held here today under the auspices of A. C. Rankin of Chicago, who has been at work the past year organizing clubs in Iowa to forward a movement for the adoption of a system of having state marshals to look after the enforcement of the prohibitory liquor laws. The meeting today was to perfect the draft of the bill which was outlined at a meeting held last May in Grinnell, when the temporary organization was effected. The bill as perfected today was placed in the hands of a legislative committee to be pushed before the general assembly provides for five marshal districts in the state, each one to have a state marshal appointed by the governor for four years, and each marshal is privileged to appoint deputies who may be subject to transfer from one district to another. These marshals and deputies will be paid a salary or per diem an expense, out of the funds collected from licenses, and they are to have full and exclusive charge of the enforcement of the laws relating to the sale of liquors, with power to prosecute direct and employ counsel in the prosecution of offenders where the local authorities have failed to act. The draftsmen who are authorized to sell liquors shall report to these marshals the same as to the county officials. The marshals shall have power to assess mulct taxes where they find sales have been made and the taxes not placed against the property. The club appointed a legislative committee to present this matter to the members of the assembly. The attendance at the meeting was large, there being nearly 200 present.
