

LOOK FOR WAR ON ALL RATES

Railroad Men Fear General Fight as Result of Grain Tariff Contest. LATTER NOW CUT DOWN TO THE MINIMUM

The Milwaukee and Burlington have promptly met the Chicago Great Western's latest cut of grain rates and the Northwestern is expected to meet it. As these rates are about as low as they can be, it is anticipated now that the war will branch out so as to involve all the Omaha-Chicago roads over all classes of commodities.

The last cut of grain rates is one of 2 cents per hundred, making the rates from Omaha to Chicago 5 cents on wheat and 7 cents on corn. The rates from the Missouri river to the Mississippi river are not affected by the last cut, and still stand at 5 cents on wheat and 4 cents on corn.

Stickney's Last Move.

The last move of Mr. Stickney in announcing a reduction in the rates to Chicago without making a like reduction in the Mississippi river and Iowa rates shows that he is about at the end of his string so far as grain rates are concerned, and if he proposes to raise up the fight, which he evidently intends to do, he must cast about for some other kind of ammunition with which to carry on the war.
