Ex-Chairman Lehr Visits Headquarters, Contradicting Omads of Friction.

RUMORS ABOUT SCHNEIDER PUNCTURED

Chairman Burgess Takes Occasion to Effectively Explode Campaign Fakes Connected by the Opposition Press for Thunder.

Henry F. Lehr of Alton, who resigned from the chairmanship of the republican state central committee because of press of private business and the illness of his wife, was a caller at the state headquarters.

Chairman Burgess also has taken occasion to deny statements to the effect that National Committeeman H. B. Schneider of Fremont is trying to arrange matters so that republican members of the next legislature would be unfriendly to the Farmers' and Independent Elevator interests of the state.

The matter was brought up at the meeting of the committee and candidates last Saturday, said Chairman Burgess, and Mr. Schneider denied any such interest or efforts. His statement satisfied the inquirers and left no doubt but that the reports are unfounded.

Efforts are under way toward getting speakers of national prominence from the east to speak in Nebraska, but who may be assigned will not be known till after the first of the month.

Efforts of local democrats to organize a Parker and Davis league in Omaha are limping along without much display of spontaneity or enthusiasm.
