SOME CHANGES IN VEGETABLE MARKET Parsnips About the Only Sort Missing, but Prices on One Kind Go Up as Another Comes Down.

"Strawberries, 10 Cents a Quart," was the rather startling sign displayed in some of the grocery stores Thursday, but a glimpse of the berries relieved their selling price of any surprise, for they were either under-ripe, over-ripe or over-soft and uninviting.

Chickens are 1 cent cheaper now than they were at this time last week, but they still remain rather scarce.

Grapefruit looks better than it has for several weeks and sells from 15 to 25 cents a dozen. Oranges are from 30 to 40 cents a dozen, and the very best lemons 20 cents a dozen.

The dried fruits begin to look as though their season is about done for; while there is still fine quality of dried or evaporated fruits to be had, the coming of the berries has greatly decreased the demand for them and the stock in most groceries is getting low.

Several varieties of fresh vegetables were lacking in the display this week, but the week's end demand has restored most of them and parsnips are about the only thing lacking now.

The smaller one sell for 5 cents and the larger for 10 cents a bunch. Artichokes are to be had, but they look a bit rusty and sell for 5 cents each. Cucumbers are 15 and 30 cents each and tomatoes are 20 cents a bunch. Soup bunches are 5 cents each, parsley 5 cents a bunch, mint 10 cents a bunch and watercress 5 cents a bunch.

New potatoes remain at 10 cents a pound, though some grocers sell three pounds for 15 cents. Sweet potatoes are practically out of market. A few small local shipments have been received, however, and these, with a few that some of the merchants happen to have left over, are selling for 5 cents a pound. They are not very nice.

There is only one class of eggs now-a-days, that is according to retail quotation, but it has been no unexciting thing of late to find more than one class in a single dozen. In the main, however, eggs are fresh and good and they have sold this week at 17 and 18 cents a dozen.

The best brands of creamery butter—all of them—have sold this week for 30 cents a pound, and the dairy butters range from 25 to 30 cents a pound. The country and dairy butters are improving right along and chances are that butter will not take many more jumps up to 30 cents a pound.

Very few new varieties of fresh fish are coming in and all fresh fish is very hard to get now, as the northern lakes are full of floating ice, making it almost impossible to get the boats on the water to lower the nets.

Halibut is retailing at 15 cents, salmon 15 cents, white fish 15 cents, trout 15 cents, black bass 25 cents a pound, rock shad 15 cents to 25 cents and buck shad 45 cents to 75 cents a piece. Bock wurst has been in but a short time and is selling at 15 cents a pound.

Chickens are 1 cent cheaper now than they were at this time last week, but they still remain rather scarce. They are selling from 12 1/2 cents to 15 cents a pound, geese 14 cents, capons 20 cents to 22 cents a pound, common squabs are 25 cents a piece and the homers are from 25 cents to 50 cents a piece. Turkey will remain from 30 cents to 22 cents a pound. Only frozen broilers can be obtained and they are 50 cents a piece. Genuine lamb is retailing at 11 1/2 cents forequarters and 12 hindquarters.
