Nebraska PROTEST ON PRINTER'S BILL Board Deducts \$31.05 from Charge for Printing Labor Report.

Fires on the Fourth of July Newly Installed State Official Issues Formal Proclamation on Topic. LINCOLN, Neb., July 1.—(Special.)—A. V. Johnson, state fire commissioner, today as a first official act, issued the following:

First—In the effort to preserve life and protect property the place for the authorities to begin is with the sellers of fireworks. Ordinances and laws prohibiting the sale of the more dangerous variety of fireworks may be enforced more readily than orders seeking to regulate or prohibit their use after they have been sold.

Second—Small children should not be permitted by their parents or guardians to handle fireworks or matches. Third—All persons using matches or punk or lighted firecrackers should be careful to see that these do not contain fire when they leave their hands and when they are thrown away they should not be thrown in the vicinity of inflammable material.
