WRECK AT PLATTSMOUTH

Burlington Fast Freight Crashes Into Switch Engine.

FIREMAN BLISS BADLY INJURED

Both Engines Are Demolished and Several Carloads of Fruit and Merchandise Scattered Over Tracks.

PLATTSMOUTH, Neb., July 2--(Special.)

A bad wreck occurred in the yards here last night about midnight, when the Burlington fast freight No. 14, from Omaha, came around a sharp curve as it approached the north yards, and going in on the west sidetrack crashed into the switch engine and demolished both engines and wrecked four freight cars loaded with fruit and general merchandise, which were scattered over the tracks. The enginesmen saw the coming collision and all jumped and saved their lives except Fireman Bliss, who was working his second night as fireman on the switch engine, and his left foot was caught between the two engines and so badly crushed that Drs. Cook and Livingston found it necessary to amputate the limb between the ankle and knee. The engines kept the track, but the cars were badly smashed and scattered over the tracks. The switching crew had gone in to do some work and had left the switch open and the engine on the incoming train did not see it in time to stop his train before the crash came. The east through track was cleared in time for the morning passenger trains to pass nearly on time.

Order Served on Father Murphy

He is Enjoined from Acting as Catholic Priest Anywhere in Lincoln Diocese.

SEWARD, Neb., July 2--(Special.)

Murphy of Seward was today served with a blanket injunction order issued yesterday by Judge George Corcoran at York, in which he is not only restrained from acting as rector of the church at Ullyses, but from acting or attempting to act as a Catholic priest in any of the churches comprised in the Lincoln diocese. The court order is an after-effect of the demonstration against Bishop Bonanzum and two priests who accompanied him at Ullyses two weeks ago tonight. The order is a sweeping one, and friends of Father Murphy are inclined to regard it as a distinct interference with religious liberty, but they say that it will be obeyed until the courts have had an opportunity to act. The suit is brought in the name of the corporation of the Church of the Immaculate Conception, the name of the Ullyses church.

Takes Poison by Mistake.

BROKEN BOW, Neb., July 2--(Special.)--Mrs. J. E. Caldwell, formerly of Lincoln, who now manages the Iteneau hotel on the north side, came near making a fatal mistake late last night when she unconsciously substituted a bottle of carbolic acid for one containing medicine. She had been working hard all day and upon going to her room did not strike a light, but went to a shelf where the medicine was kept and took down a bottle, supposing it to be the right one. She filled a tablespoon with the liquid and swallowed it before she realized it was carbolic acid. Mrs. Caldwell, who is a trained nurse by profession, attempted at first to administer self-treatment, but rapidly becoming worse, medical aid was called and when Drs. Pennington and Talbot arrived at the scene fifty minutes later, they found the patient in spasms. After being worked over all night, Mrs. Caldwell was pronounced out of danger, although still in a serious condition.

Grand Island Commercial Club.

GRAND ISLAND, July 2--(Special.)--The present corn weather is not sufficient to shrivel the arbor of the Commercial club and at a well attended meeting last evening it was decided to appoint a committee on arrangements and a committee on securing train facilities for the purpose of taking a series of trips to the patrons of the Grand Island wholesale and retail business interests in the surrounding towns. The first trip probably to be taken in motor cars to Ord. The action of the executive committee in assuring the support of the club to the chautauqua undertaking, with the view of making a permanent local organization out of it next year, was also endorsed.

Injured in Jump from Train.

KEARNEY, Neb., July 2--(Special.)--R. E. Parker, a young man from Brady, was severely hurt by jumping from train No. 4 Thursday morning. Parker thought the train was going on through Kearney without stopping and wishing to get off in Kearney, he jumped. The train was just crossing Second avenue, near the Transmississippi elevator, and Parker alighted on his face and landed along on it and his knees. The flesh was badly torn from his face and his knee caps were laid bare, making him unable to move his limbs. He was taken to the city hospital.

Girl Accuses Her Father.

TECUMSEH, Neb., July 2--(Special.)--Dr. J. G. Neff, a dentist of Sterling, was brought into the county court here today on a statutory charge, his 17-year-old daughter, Lora Neff, signing the complaint. The case was heard before Judge James Livingston, J. C. Moore appearing for the state and E. R. Hitchcock for the defendant. Dr. Neff refused to plead. He was placed under bond in the sum of \$1,000 to appear for trial at the district court. Bond was furnished. Dr. Neff enjoyed a good reputation here.

School Teacher Injured.

SIDNEY, Ia., July 2--(Special.)--Miss Grace Hawley, teacher of physics in the Sidney High school, was severely injured at her home while making a demonstration in her line of work. A small glass vial was placed in a larger one to make an experiment. Owing to some defect in the glass the larger bottle burst and severely lacerated Miss Hawley's left hand, cutting it to the bone.

Senator Cummins replied briefly to the speech made yesterday by Senator Root in favor of the corporation tax. Mr. Cummins said there was no prejudice against wealth in Iowa, but that his constituents insisted on the taxation of wealth in all its forms, and not merely in some of its forms.

In the course of a colloquy with Senator McCumber as to the distinction between taxing a business and the right to conduct a business, Mr. Rayner said: "I am not in any wise responsible for the obiter dictum of the supreme court; I am not responsible for its calamitous decision and illogical conclusions in the Pollock case.
