Ruling of Justice White About Normal and Lawful Agreements Among Corporations Contrary to Precedents.

WASHINGTON, May 25 .- Associate Justice John Marshall Harlan today filed in the supreme court his formal dissenting opinion in the Standard Oil case. Not satisfied with his oral dissent from the court's decision as handed down by Chief Justice White, Justice Harlan entirely rewrote the stenographic report of his remarks from the bench. The oral dissent formed merely taining about \$,000 words, put on record

Justice Harlan brands as mischievous the modification made by the court in the decree of the lower court permitting subsidiary corporations of the Standard Oil after dissolution of the combination to "normal and lawful agreement among themselves. Chief Justice White had characterized this modification as minor matter."

The further declaration is made by Justice Harlan that he is convinced the court's opinion "will throw the business of the country into confusion and invite widely extended and harassing litigation, the injurious effects of which will be felt for many years to come."
