OMAHA GETS EVEN BREAK

Takes Last Game of Series from Sioux City.

SCORE ENDS TWELVE TO FOUR

Exhibition Given by Stenz Caused Pain to Fans Who Turned Out. Neighbors Alone Making a Showing.

Omaha broke even on the Sioux City series by winning the game Sunday afternoon. The score was 12 to 4. It was a sad affair, for the Sioux played ball with the spirit and at times played ragedly. Keeley was in the box for the Bourkes, and pitched a nice game. He was given fair support except on four occasions, when four boots were made. He allowed but four hits, one of which was a home run by Neighbors that sailed over the right fence in the fourth. Sioux Welch hit him for a three-bagger. Neighbors for a double and Hartman for a single. The other seven Sioux who endeavored to connect with his error never touched them.

Alderman started the game for the Indians and got a bad getaway. It was not all his fault, either, for his teammates made a terrible mess of things right at the jump and did not improve as the game proceeded. He was wild throughout and after he had passed three in the fourth and two more in the fifth in addition to allowing a three-bagger and two singles, with but one done, was taken out and Chabeck was sent in. MOTOR RECORDS

Reach Low Ebb at Indianapolis

HARRON WINS SENSATIONAL TWO-HUNDRED-MILE RACE IN TWO HOURS FORTY-SIX MINUTES

INDIANAPOLIS, May 29.—In desperate struggles for supremacy among drivers of the most powerful American cars, records went down for all distances between five and 200 miles at the Indianapolis speedway today and in the meretricious grind only two men were injured.

Herbert Lytle, the driver, and his mechanic, William Clifton, were hurled from their car, an American, when a front tire burst as they were turning into the home stretch in the last lap of the ten-mile free for all handicap. The car plunged into the sand at the inner edge of the track and was smashed. Lytle's left leg was broken and Clifton was badly bruised.

Harron, driving a Marmon, achieved the sensational long distance triumph in the history of automobile racing in this country, when he won the 200 mile race in 2:46:31, breaking the record, which had been held by Chevrolet, who won the distance in 2:46:45, at Atlanta.

The performance of Lynch, in a Jackson, who was second, was hardly less brilliant, for he did not stop once in the long fierce fight, while Harron had to pause a few minutes at the end of the hundred mile for gasoline. The five mile record for cars of 451 to 600 cubic inches piston displacement, was broken by Barney Oldfield and his Knox. Jumping into the lead at the start, Oldfield beat Harron in a two and one-half mile course, with Herr and Altken in Nationals following closely. Oldfield's time was 4:03. The old record was 4:43.

Altken (National) took the honor of breaking the record for ten miles for cars of 301 to 450 inches displacement. His time was 8:05, against the former record of 8:17, and Harron (Marmon) and Merz (National), who were second and third, shared in the victory, for the three were bunched almost to the finish.
