MOVE AGAINST RADICALS IN STEEL STRIKE ZONE

Chicago, Ills., Oct. 8.—Further activity against radicals in Gary, Ind., closing of twenty-one alleged hideouts in Indiana Harbor, and a reported return of a few hundred more strikers to the mills were the only developments today in the Chicago steel strike district. Military intelligence officers and agents of the Department of Justice held a conference today relative to agitation and the distribution of inflammatory literature.

Federal troops in control at Gary, Ind., were expected to remain an indefinite period. Colonel W. S. Mason, in command, while retaining the prohibition against outdoor mass meetings said no interference with strikers indoor meetings need be expected as long as they were orderly.

Operations of mills at Gary, South Chicago, Indiana Harbor, Waukegan and Joliet were said to have been increased today, officials reporting greater production.

Union leaders denied that production had been advanced or that the strikers had returned to work.

Oponents Afraid of a Vote.

Washington, Oct. 8.—Opponents of the peace treaty today blocked all attempts to bring the Shantung amendment to a vote in the Senate this week and then refused to accede to a joint request by Republicans and Democratic leaders for its consideration one week hence.

In the half-hour wrangle that followed the suggestion of Chairman Lodge, of the Foreign Relations Committee, that the Senate could speed up the treaty by reading the printed text while Senators were preparing speeches on the Shantung provision, the charge was made and denied that a full fledged filibuster soon might envelop the pact and delay final action on it.

EX-SHERIFF BELL

DISAPPEARS AGAIN

Henderson, Oct. 9.—The capias last Friday to Currituck county of Sheriff J. E. C. Bell, calling for his return to Vance county to answer charges of embezzling some \$40,000 or more of the county's funds, was presented to him at his old home at Shawboro Monday. Bell, it is understood, was taken into custody by authorities there, and telephone communication was immediately established between Judge W. M. Bond, presiding at the present term of Superior court here, and who deposited the issuance of the capias.

Judge Bond instructed the Currituck authorities that the bond should be fixed at \$10,000, and in event Bell provides it he is to be allowed to remain there or go where he chooses until he comes here to answer the charges preferred, which will probably be at the March, 1920 term of court. Should he fail to give bond the only alternative, it is said, is for him to be brought back to Henderson and delivered to the court authorities. It had not been learned at noon Tuesday whether or not the required bond had been secured by the former but it was the general opinion that relatives in Currituck county would be able to provide the security designated by Judge Bond.

Not to be Found.
It was noted with surprise today that former Bell was not to be found in Currituck county, in accordance with a letter received from the authorities there Wednesday.

THE AMERICAN COTTON ASSOCIATION NORTH CAROLINA DIVISION

Raleigh, Oct. 10.—The objects of the cotton warehouse law and the subterfuge plans for aiding depressed cotton involve no new principle, says Commissioner of Agriculture W. A. Graham, who recalls a bit of history in connection with the effort of the cotton farmers to organize themselves into American Cotton Association in order that they may the better avail themselves of the warehouse law and the effort of the federal government to aid the cotton grower.

The main objects of each of these measures is the same as those of the Tobacco warehouse act of 1777, which was passed by the first legislature of the state, says the commissioner.

At that time when there was a vessel in port, and a means of getting the tobacco to the outside world, the tobacco put on the market sold well. When there was no vessel in port it usually sold very low. To enable the farmer to hold his tobacco each county had the right, under this old law, to erect warehouses for the storage of tobacco, and a receipt was given to the farmer for the tobacco stored, as is the case in the present warehouse law. These certificates or receipts were good anywhere and were settled when the tobacco which they represented was sold.

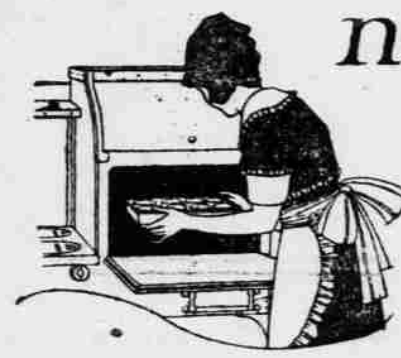
This is exactly the same general plan in the cotton warehouse act, which will enable the farmer to hold his cotton for a better price. These are the joint effort of the people of the growing communities, and the best of enlisting interest in the erection of warehouses now is through the American Cotton Association, a branch of which will be organized in every cotton growing county and ownership in the state.

In number of the counties the work of the cotton association and the cotton warehouses are being carried on at the same time. State campaign headquarters and officials of the cotton growing counties to rent any available warehouse space in their community for the time being, and register it with the state warehouse officials in order to get the benefits of the cheaper insurance rates and the backing of the State law for the warehouse receipts. This will take care of the situation temporarily and will enable the farmer to hold his cotton until the buyer is willing to pay 36 1-2 cents for it his month.

In the meantime while the canvass is being made for the cotton association, the permanent warehouses are also being talked among farmers, merchants, bankers and the general public with a view of erecting fire-proof warehouses before the next crop is harvested. This will give an organization and cotton warehouses at the same time and will bring about the objects for which the American Cotton Association is making a fight.
