KILLED WITH AN AXE.

BRUTAL MURDER COMMITTED NEAR THE CITY.

THE VICTIM AN INNOCENT OLD COLORED WOMAN.

She Fought Bravely for her Life but was Overpowered—No Clue to the Murderer.

A most brutal murder occurred three miles west of the city on Saturday night. It is the opinion of Detective Deaver, however, that the man was wounded in the struggle.

Some time ago she told her friends that she had money in the bank. No bank book was found yesterday and it is thought that it was taken.

The murdered woman was about 53 years old and was, in old slavery days, the property of Senator Vance, and later was given to the Rev. R. N. Price.

She was known to the citizens of Asheville better by the name of Harriet Vance than by the name of Williams. The latter was the name of her husband who deserted her twenty-three years ago.

The coroner's jury adjourned without agreeing upon a verdict and will hold another meeting. The case is in the hands of the sheriff and the officers are doing their best to run the murderer down, but as yet there is positively no clue.

The funeral took place at 3 o'clock this afternoon from Wilson's Chapel, about a mile from the home of the dead woman.

GOSSIP OF THE DAY.

Now the New York Sun has gone into the business of giving to lovely woman certain interesting points on how to make herself even more attractive than she really is. First the Sun calls attention to the lack of grace and steadiness in carriage which has become a real affliction to the friends of the many young women who tumble and slide and trip along the streets while on walking.

Next the Sun assails the lack of melodious voices among the American women, and complains of the "discords we hear so frequently; the flatness, the shrillness, the indistinctness, the nasal quality, the false modulation, the distressing emphasis."

The Sun has reasons for asking for reform in these directions, and it would also have excellent arguments in plenty to urge, if it cared to, against the same faults among men. On some of the streets of Asheville it would be a very hard matter for any man to walk with the ease and sureness of footing that ought to characterize the practiced pedestrian.

But the argument would still hold that upon very few roads of any kind would the American man walk with a style that would entitle him to respectful attention. As for the voices of many men, they will easily take as many demerit marks as the voices of the women. Indistinctness and lack of cultivation are two of the worst of the besetting sins, although the others are all there with them.

Quite a rarity is the man who can spring gracefully to his feet at a dinner or upon a platform, and treat the assembled auditors to a neat, compact bundle of arguments and remarks uttered in a pleasant, easy, well modulated tone that falls upon the ear with the smooth pleasing of the mellow lute, or even with the harmonious disturbance of a bass drum when in the hands of an artist whose soulful, earnest, thoughtful thumpings are full of careful anxiety to please and hopefulness that each distinct and separate bill shall have its due value in the homogeneous blowings and banging of the members of a big brass band.

Quite a rarity, too, is the fellow who can give an order in a store or restaurant without having the clerk or waiter come back to ask him to try it over and tell them once again what some particular thing was that he mumbled over without sufficient clearness to make himself understood.
