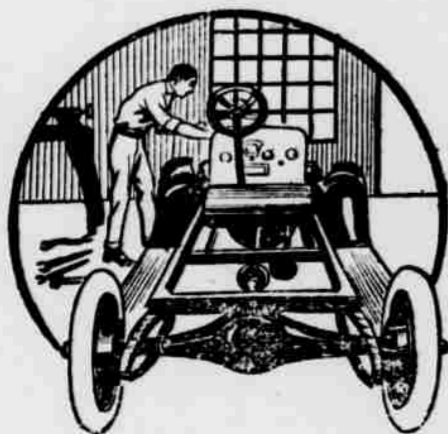

MASONIC FUNERAL FOR MR. J. S. SETZER

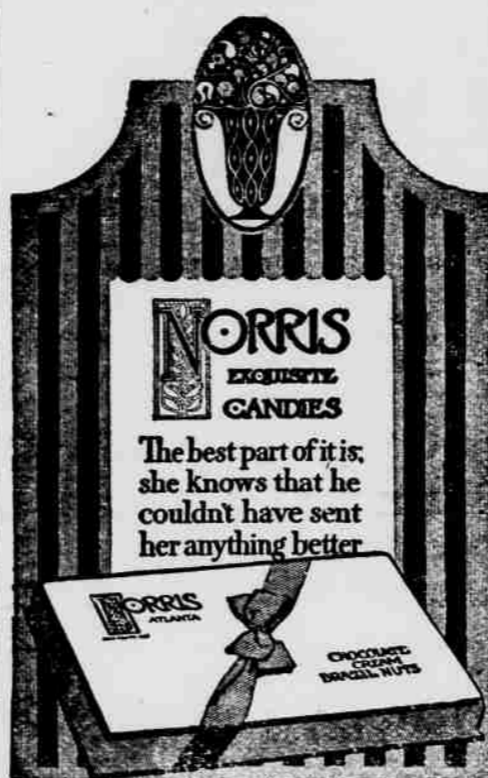

THE EMERGENCY HOME

When Catherine Booth lay dead in state in England, and the body was viewed by hundreds and thousands, and lords and ladies walked past the casket to do honor to a noble woman, finally the room was given to the poor to view the body of their friend. They came in a great mass to see the dead face of their friend. At last there came a poor woman, a shawl pinned over her head, in her arms a baby and beside her an older child. When she reached the casket she put the baby down, loosed the clasp of the other child and bent over the coffin. Stooping thus she placed the crown and an attendant bade her move on. But she said, "I will not move on, I have walked forty miles to see this woman's face. She saved my boys from hell and I have a right to look and weep." Then she bent over and covered the glass above the dead face with kisses, while the people sobbed in sympathy with her.

Catherine Booth was the mother of the Salvation Army, and through the inspiration of her sacrifice and love, and that of her husband, Gen. William Booth, the praises of God are being sung in the world today who were saved from degradation and shame, by this godly man and woman, and many more thousands are rejoicing in life and happiness, as they live today, in hundreds of cities and towns, lives of honesty and virtue, snatched from the jaws of shame and the clutches of Satan by the workers who have followed William and Catherine Booth, as they followed the Christ who sought and saved the lost.

We have representatives of these workers here in Hickory conducting just such a work. They are the Volunteers of America and their Emergency home on Eighth avenue. Their work is labor of love and is moved by the mighty power of a resolution to rescue the perishing. They are willing to attempt the form of human salvage work they wish to do. They are worthy of the support of the people of this community, and yet the people seem slow to acknowledge. Even the churches are not prepared to do the work the Volunteers are willing to do. Here at the Emergency home is a place we can shelter wanderers and share in the Savior's work with these workers.

These Volunteers deserve help and are worthy of our confidence. I have investigated and am confident of their integrity. Winter is coming. Our poor must be cared for. No better agents could be found than the Volunteers. Let us support them.

The Miracle

Memphis Commercial Appeal. According to the Associated Press the most reliable source of news information in the world, Germany can now serve six square meals for 50 cents. It is a miracle and we had been led to believe that the day of miracles was over.

At home it is a difficult matter to secure any sort of meal for 50 cents. Even the cheap restaurants have advanced prices so that a man of meager means eats and leaves hungry. The thought that six square meals can be purchased for 50 cents seems unbelievable.

The news comes from Cologne, and declares that this particular municipality is conducting the biggest restaurant in the world. It feeds six days a week nearly half of its population of about 700,000 at the astonishing price of two marks, or 50 cents, for the six square meals.

War has been tragic in many ways, the most tragic war, possibly, in the

history of the world, but it has taught the belligerent nations a lesson in economy.

The waste of the old world has been reduced to a minimum. Things that were wasted before are used today. There is no longer the neglect in the care of insignificant details.

It is a lesson that we might well consider at home. We uselessly throw away much that might be well used and save the cost of living.

The cost of living has ceased to be a joke, it is a problem, and when we read and know how 350,000 people can be fed on 50 cents a week it is about time that we began to consider what we might do at home.

There is something wrong, somewhere. There are more chickens in the United States than ever before in history, and there are more eggs, but someone has organized a little corner and is holding them.

But if Cologne, Germany, can afford to feed half of the city population at the rate of six square meals for 50 cents, it looks like we should do the same thing at home.

Of course the menu may not be altogether to our taste, but it is, at least, life sustaining and this counts. All we ask for is the right to live.

Less Danger in Dirt

Recent inquiries tend to show that the dangers of dirt, dust, foul odors and unesthetic conditions generally, have been greatly exaggerated. Information has been sought from municipal officers, hospitals and insurance companies, in Canada and the United States, and the meager statistics obtainable give no evidence of excessive mortality in those who work constantly in the dirt and dust of city streets. Citing experience in New York city, it is shown that in the same period of six years, the street cleaning department recorded a death rate of 14.8 per 1,000, while the health department found a death rate of 15 per 1,000 for all males between the ages of 20 and 70.

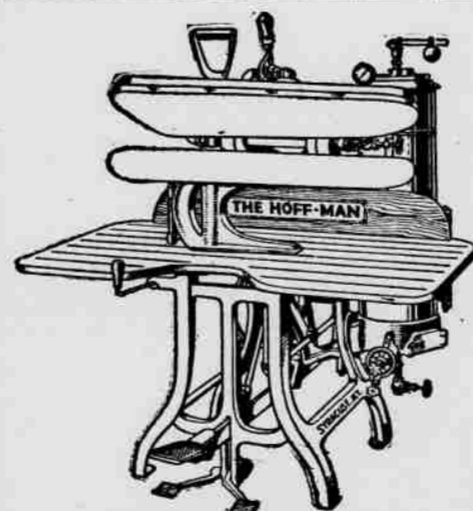
