REDUCE WAR PENSIONS

London, England, March 7.—British war widows are re-marrying so rapidly that the chancellor, Austen Chamberlain, expects to be able to reduce pensions appropriations in this year's budget by 10,000,000 pounds sterling. This, however, is only one of the factors contributing to the anticipated reduction but it is stated that thousands of women made widows by the war have again become wives and thus automatically taken their names off the pension list. The pensions granted to widows of soldiers who died in active service are withdrawn when the widows remarry.

FUNERAL SERVICE FOR MRS. SMYRE IS HELD

Susan Ellen Miller Smyre departed this life on March 10, 1921, age 63 years, 5 months and 2 days. She was born August 17, 1852, in Mulberry Grove, Carroll County, Tenn. On the 30th of May, 1870, she was united in holy matrimony to Francis Shuford Smyre. On the 30th of May, last year, surrounded by their children and a host of relatives and friends they had the blessed opportunity of celebrating their golden wedding anniversary, a privilege that few live to enjoy. To this union were born two sons and five daughters, one daughter, Lula, wife of the Rev. A. L. Bolick, preceding her mother in death some years ago. The children who survive are: Clinton of Clovis, New Mexico; Worth of Amarillo, Texas; Mrs. B. L. Westenbarger of Whitestown, Ind.; Mrs. C. C. Howe of Canton, Ohio; Mrs. Hubert Patterson of Albemarle, N. C.; and Mrs. Thomas Huit of Conover. She had twenty grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Smyre built the first home and had the first child born in Conover. Mrs. Smyre was a life long member of the Evangelical Lutheran church.

The funeral services were conducted by her pastor, the Rev. Geo. E. Mennen in Concordia church and the funeral sermon was based on the text which the deceased herself had chosen, the beautiful and comforting words of St. John 14:1-7. Her body was laid to rest in the Concordia cemetery at the resurrection morning. All the children were present at their mother's funeral except Worth, who was kept away on account of sickness.

The sympathy of many friends go out to the bereaved husband and family and we commend them in the safe hands of Him who says: "I am with you always unto the end of the world."

PERMIT TO MAKE WINE OUT OF STRAWBERRIES IS ISSUED

Washington, March 24.—A permit to manufacture wine out of strawberries for non-beverage purposes was issued last night to the Strawberry Growers' association of Louisiana by the bureau of internal revenue. Provision is made in the permit that no sugar shall be added to increase the alcoholic content of the product.

While no explanation of the issuance of the permit was made by the bureau officials, said the strawberry growers had appealed to the prohibition authorities for permission to set up a winery in order to care for their surplus crop, which was estimated to be worth about \$5,000,000. Under the Volstead act, it was explained, it is legal to establish wineries for the manufacture of non-beverage products for sacramental or medicinal purposes.

Seed dealers say that they have never had such a run on clover and oats seeds and feedstuffs will be raised in abundance in this section this year.

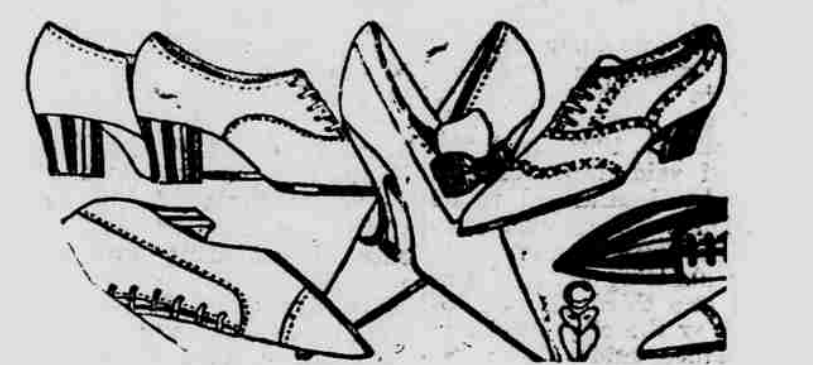
