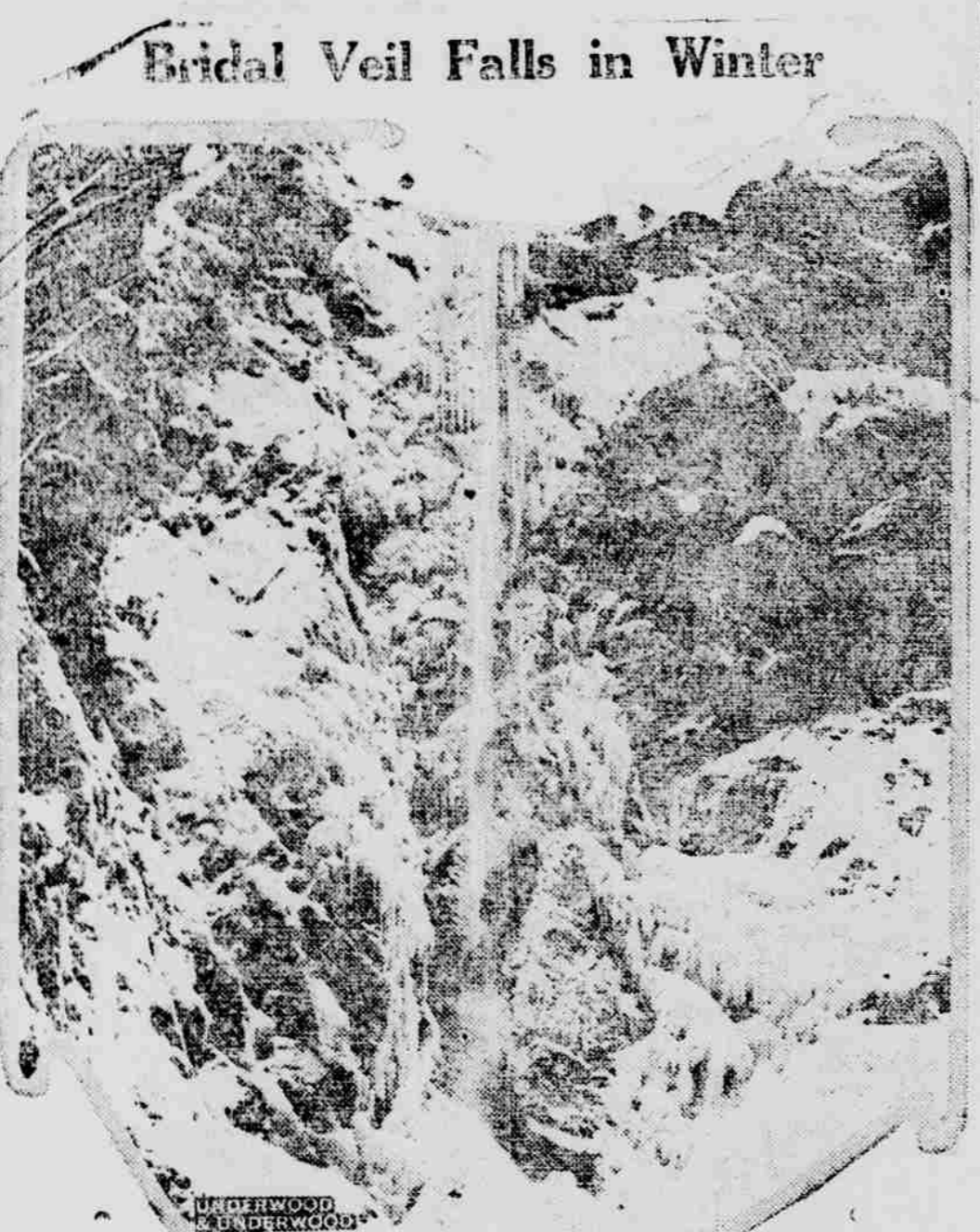

IRRECONCILABLES DIE HARD  
Dying hard the irreconcilable element which had opposed the treaty on the ground that it establishes an alliance between the United States, Great Britain, Japan and France, 83 roll calls during a four and a half hour session set aside for final action on the resolution of ratification. They made their best showing on a suspended reservation to bring outside powers into Pacific "conferees" affecting their interests, manufacturing water for the proposal to 53 in opposition.  
The committee reservation was rejected in the end by a vote of 49 to 2, two attempts to modify it failing by overwhelming majorities. It declares that "the United States understands that under the statement in the preamble or under the terms of this treaty there is no commitment to armed force, no alliance, no obligation to join in any defense."  
Although the debate was prohibited during the day's session under a unanimous consent agreement, the treaty opponents seized a point of order in regard to the declaration accompanying the treaty but not a part of it, and laid the basis for continuing their assault tomorrow when the supplemental treaty defining the scope of the four power pact comes up for consideration. It is the hope of the administration leaders, however, that the supplemental treaty may be ratified and all that pertains to the four power agreement declared off the senate calendar before tomorrow night.  
52 Stand Firm All Day.  
Throughout the day's voting a bloc of 53 Republicans stood solidly against all reservations and amendments except the "no alliance" declaration of the committee. The four Republican irreconcilables, Senators Borah, Idaho; France, Maryland; Johnson, California, and LaFollette, Wisconsin, were the only members of their side of the chamber who voted consistently for qualifying proposals, although Senator Norris, Republican, Nebraska, supported several and Senator Ladd, Republican, North Dakota voted for one.  
On the Democratic side there was less unanimity of action. The 25 Democrats who finally voted against ratification voted together on most roll calls in favor of amendments and reservations but a group of 8 or 10 stood with their party leader, Senator Underwood, of Alabama, in opposition to most of the proposed changes. In the 36 to 55 vote on the "outside powers" reservation, however, Senator Underwood's following reached its minimum strength, only Senators Williams of Mississippi and Myers of Montana, joining him on the Democratic side in opposition to the proposal.  
The long succession of roll calls was witnessed by one of the largest gallery crowds that have ever attended a senate session.

STRONG SERMON TO MEMBERS OF POST

The annual sermon before Post K. Traveler's Executive Association was delivered by Rev. W. R. Bradshaw announced that Dr. Chas. E. Church, yesterday morning. A section of the middle part of the auditorium was reserved for the members of the post, something over 50 being present, and the rest of the congregation overflowed the church and crowded most of the seats in the Sunday school room. Mr. Bradshaw announced that Dr. Chas. E. Madley, corresponding secretary of the British state organization, would be here next Sunday night to appear for the first time in his official capacity.

A cordial welcome was extended to the members of the local post before the sermon, which was eloquent and carried a message of compelling force. Mr. Bradshaw read the tenth chapter of Proverbs and chose for text from the 22d verse: "The blessing of the Lord, it maketh rich, and he addeth no sorrow with it."  
The minister discussed the purposes of the T. P. A., briefly giving its membership in the state as 4,117, referred to the fact that these members were constantly on the road and emphasized his text by referring to their opportunities to do good. The members of the T. P. A. have hurried away for good roads, better transportation and better hotel facilities and they have an accident insurance policy that is both cheap and protective.

Post K. Mr. Bradshaw said was the best organization in North Carolina for the size of the city and declared that its memberships are not permitted to lapse.  
Getting down to his text, Mr. Bradshaw said if he were a business man he would not put Christianity before his business. He would not advertise his wares falsely; he would not sell things he was opposed to and here he referred to the apparent fact that this section is the paradise of the bootlegger, and he would try to bring the rules of his business into his church.

There are always two ways to act, the minister said; one is the dark and painful way, the other is the light and joyful way. The man who really gets the best of his circumstances will choose the light in the end. The most cheerful people get better quickest if they are sick, and the most cheerful men get along better in business. It is the spirit of the man that makes for success—and the man who smiles on fortune is bound to receive a smile from fortune.  
Think best of all men, Mr. Bradshaw here told, told the story of a young boy to illustrate his point. "There is always something good to be had if we but look for it. This canine was a sorry specimen and first one man and another were picking out its faults. One man inspected the dog and observed that 'pencils are not whiter than its teeth. It is easy to see faults and to criticize, but if you want to do the best by you, you must think best by them.'

Having traveled for ten years, Mr. Bradshaw said he knew the temptations that beset traveling men and the hardships they experienced so often away from home and loved ones. He also knew their opportunities for making the world better, and he declared that if Christian business men would but take a strong stand on the side of Christ, they were bound to succeed. God gives us our brains and the capacity for success, and traveling men can be representatives of God and His kingdom in the world God giveveth and taketh away, as Job observed as his servants came to him with assistance upon misfortune. We should give ourselves and goods to God, live and work for him.

The manager of the Moline team, Earl Mack, is a son of the famous Connie Mack, manager of the Athletics, and a fast exhibition is expected when the boys try to put one over the old man.
