TO PLANT BIG ORCHARD.

Durham, N. C., May 5.—The North Carolina Orchards Company is the name of a new corporation that has been given a charter by the Secretary of State and will begin soon the development of a Harnett county piece of property that is stupendous in its proportions.

Judge J. S. Manning of the law firm of Manning & Everett is attorney for

the company and briefly outlined its purpose in an interview last night. Judge Manning says that the moving selspirit of the company is a Mr. W. S. Hoosel of New York State, in the vicinity of Rochester and that he is putting Yankee brains and money into the project. There are North Carolina gentlemen interested in it, Brodie L. Duke of Durham, J. O. Ellington of Fayetteville and also Northern capitalists.

The property purchased includes about 10,000 acres of good Harnett land and its first cost is slightly above \$100,000 with the line of railroad of thirteen miles coming into this calculation. This road was built by a lumber company that cut down the timber and is still in good shape for shipping. The company will grow peaches, pecans, fruits of several natures and vegetables.
