IMPROVEMENTS AT LINVILLE.

New Management for Hotel in This Famous Mountain Resort.

Linville, which for many years has been one of the most famous resorts in North Carolina, is this year being made one of the most attractive spots in the mountains. Great improvements are being made, and the Linville Improvement Company, of which Donald MacRae is president; John F. Dixie, vice-president; Hugh MacRae, treasurer; R. M. Sheppard, secretary, and H. From Raleigh a direct connection for Linville is made by the Seaboard Air Line to Lincolnton and the Western and Norfolk Railroad thence to within a few miles of this famous resort.

A. & M. Field Day.

The A. and M. College "track team" will hold Field Day next Monday afternoon, May 11th, at the Fair Grounds, beginning at 4:15 sharp. The A. and M. boys have been practicing sometimes in anticipation of a college meet, which would have included Trinity, Wake Forest and A. and M., but for reasons unknown Trinity withdrew, and on account of the death of Prof. Crittenden Wake Forest's trainer, they have also withdrawn. The A. and M. boys are sorry not to have an opportunity to meet Trinity and Wake Forest this year, but since this can't be they will do the next best thing, viz: the different classes will compete for track honors. The events will be hurdling, sprinting, running, hammer throwing, shot putting, pole vaulting, broad and high jumping and some others of a more or less interesting and amusing nature. The date for the contest has been arranged with special reference to the girls' schools, Monday being a holiday with them, and it is hoped that there will be present a large delegation from Peace, St. Mary's and B. F. U., and also that A. and M.'s town friends will be much in evidence. Admission fifteen cents.
