NEGRO BOY FIRE-BUG HERE

Josephus Williams Landed in the Pen for Twenty-five Years

Sheriff J. C. Crawford, of Martin county, was here yesterday, having come to the city to bring Josephus Williams, a negro boy of thirteen to the State's prison to serve a term of twenty-five years. He is the boy who was convicted Monday in the Martin county court of larceny and arson. He had set fire to Anderson, Hassell & Co's. store, which was completely destroyed, the loss being over \$10,000. The boy has escaped from the county jail at Williamston several times.

Rev. J. T. Jenkins will leave Raleigh today for Kansas City, Mo., where he has been elected State Evangelist under the State Baptist Mission Board. Mr. Jenkins has a host of friends in North Carolina where he has held revivals. 
