of the gunboat Vixen. Four were resued by a crew from that vessel, who heard cries of distress and rowed half a mile to the spot where the boat capsized. The boat contained a large amount of chain as ballast and when the squall struck the boat the chain shifted and the boat capsized. A strong tide was running toward the gulf. MOST MARVELOUS GOOD.

Convinced That They Have Done This the Peace Congress Fades Suavely Away.

(By the Associated Press.) Boston, Mass., Oct. 5.—There were two aspects memorable in their na-ture, according to the delegates themselves, which have made a pro-nounced impression during the delibrations of the International Peace Congress, which was brought to a today in this city, after many meetings extending throughout week. One of these was that the congress, together with its numerous public gatherings which were held under its auspices, constituted one of the most remarkable educational in-fluences ever observed in America. The second aspect or conviction was that this year's congress should prove of vast efficacy towards the attain-ment of universal peace, if a roused public sentiment and a thorough ex-position of the absurdity and horror of warfare was to be of any avail whatsoever. The congress was adourned today to continue its work in 1905 at Lucerne, Switzerland. sides adopting resolutions denouncing war and calling for the creation of international obligatory intreaties the ongress today "recommended an inquiry by the powers into the Congo

The present Russo-Japanese was treated by a resolve calling upon the Emperors of the two counries to end the conflict at once, or that failing, for the powers to exercise the authority granted by article 27 of the Hague Pact and intervene so that the war might be terminated. In this connection the congress suggested to the powers the adoption of a tive peace making and peace insuring treaty under which all war would be possible but for a brief period.
