## What Roosevelt Said of Them in 1896.

Falsely Declared That Bryan Had a Great Hold on the Unintelligent and the Vicious of the Land.

At a rally of the Sound Money
Club at the Wool Exchange in New
York City October 27, 1896, the leading speakers were General Horace Porter and Police Commissioner Theodore Roosevelt. Mr. Roosevelt had but recently returned from a stumptour of the West, in which he had devoted much time to Illinois. In the course of his speech at this Sound Money Club meeting at the Wool Exchange, he said:

"I shall confine my remarks to what General Porter has said about patriotism. Patriotism comes first and I hope you will not fail to display it

next Tuesday.
"Mr. Bryan and his adherents have the farmers,
"If they are not so, then why do

they believe that he can make a dol-lar out of fifty cents? He tells them it can be brought about by a free royalty—the right to burn and plunder without the interference of the

(The ort of this speech was taken to m the New York Journal of October 28, 1896.)

It appears that this speech was not reported in any of the Republican papers of New York, but this is not innatural because the time was near the close of the campaign and so much political news was going that much of it had to be omitted. However, the sentiments of the speech were expressed on the same day that the speech was delivered and printed as an interview in the New York Sun of the same day that the New York Journal published the report of the

Extracts from the interview follow: In October, 1896, after a stumping tour, chiefly through Illinois and Michigan, Theodore Roosevelt, then Police Commissioner of the city of New York, gave a column interview to the New York Sun. This inter-view was evidently as carefully considered as Mr. Roosevelt ever considers anything. It was published in the New York Sun of October 28 2r page, 3d column. The Sun was then, as at present, on the same side of the political fence as Mr. Roosevelt and anxious to do him honor in exploiting his views. In the course of this interview, Mr. Roosevelt said:

"Men who know that they have in them the capacity of success, and who feel the thrill of pride that comes with strong hands, stout hearts, and cool heads, do not see the necessity of being jealous of anybody. The strength of the Populists lies with ignorant and vicious and also with the weak, who have not the intelligence to see that their failure in life is due not to others, but to themselves, but who wish to put the blame of their shortcomings on some

Undoubtedly Bryan has a great hold upon the unintelligent and the vicious. He attracts that type of vicious. He attracts that type of farmer whose gate hangs on the hinge, whose old hat supplies the place of a missing window pane, and who is more likely to be found at the plough. He attracts still more the professional laboring man of the type that labors as little as possible and continually strives to delude such workingmen as are ignorant and fool-ish enough to be misled into some movement which can not but end in disaster. But the thrifty, intelligent and resolute are in the majority and it was my invariable experience that men of this stamp, even if somewhat predisposed to Bryan, were repelled by the cheapness of the man. 
