COACH WALKER OF WAKE FOREST TO TALK AT MEETING

150 Expected At Dinner In Basement Of 1st. Baptist Church

Approximately 150 Yellow Jacket football players past and present, Wake Forest alumni, school band members, and invited guests are expected to attend the Annual High School Football Banquet to be held in the basement of the First Baptist Church next Tuesday night, December 12, at 7:00 p.m. Plans call for a much more elaborate program than that of last year. Coach "Peahead" Walker, head coach at Wake Forest, will be guest speaker.

The football banquet was started last year with the idea in mind of having at the end of each season a get-together of high school alumni, along with the present Yellow Jacket football team and others who are interested in high school football.

At last year's banquet, Coach Bear Wolf, popular head coach of the University of N. C., was the guest speaker and showed movies of the U.N.C.-Fordham game.

This year the guest speaker will be "Peahead" Walker, head coach of Wake Forest College, who will also show pictures of several Wake Forest games. An effort is being made to have Coach Walker bring along his four star backfield, consisting of Polanski, Gallovitch, Mayberry and Ringgold. Freshmen Coach Jim Weaver will be on hand for a short talk, it is hoped.

The local school Board will be invited. Other guest speakers will be J. T. Chase, who has seen every Yellow Jacket team in action since football was started; Carroll Wilson, Editor of the Herald; A. Meikle, Supt. Patterson Mills; T. W. Mullen, Supt. Rosemary Mfg. Co.; Mayor Bernard Allsbrook; F. C. Williams, Gen. Manager Roanoke and Patterson Mills; Dr. Bahnson Weathers; and Cranford Hoyle, Yellow Jacket head coach.

In charge of arrangements are Bill Alligood, Capt. 1926 football team; High School Alumni Reservations, Jimmie Womble, Chairman, former All Northeastern and All State Jacket Quarterback; Fleetwood Sullivan, rated the Jackets' greatest baseball catcher, halfback in football; and Elmer "Lefty" Starke, former Jacket star in baseball, football and basketball.

The Wake Forest Alumni Committee is composed of Dr. Bahnson Weathers, Chairman; Highway Patrolman "Skinny" Rothrock, and Mayor Bernard Allsbrook, aided by all other Wake Forest alumni in the county.

The toastmaster for the banquet will be none other than Ted "Tubby" Speight, great center of the 1925 football team. It is planned to have at least 70% of the football captains present from the first Yellow Jacket team to the present. Sixty-five members of the 1939 Yellow Jacket football team that

won seven, tied one and lost two games, will be present, many of them for the last time as members of the team.

NINE NEW HOMES GOING UP OVER CITY AT PRESENT

Continuing the building boom that the city has been witnessing for the past months, nine new homes are at present in the process of construction within the city limits, according to Building Inspector Henry Fitts this week. Some of the homes, being built in nearly every section of town, are almost complete, some have only the foundation started. Permits for the homes were issued between October 21 and December 1.

Mr. Fitts stated also that a permit had been given to J. Winfield Crew, Jr., for tearing down the old candy kitchen building in the tenth block on the Avenue where Mr. Crew plans to erect a large modern store building soon.

Another permit was issued in November to F. M. Coburn to build a shoe store in the ninth block on the Avenue. Work on that building has been in progress for some time.
